Defence Dept. Still Undecided On Site For New Headquarters Building

OTTAWA (CP)—For two years, the defence department has been mulling over the "where and when" of a new, multi-million dollar defence headquarters. It is still mulling it over.

In the atomic age, the choice of a site has become a major problem. Some thought was given to dispersing the department among several Ontario towns and cities well away from Ottawa, such as Kingston, Brockville and Arnprior. This now has been pretty well ruled out because it is felt such dispersal would be time-wasting and inefficient. This could be taken as a fair indication that the government is opposed generally to wide dispersal of industry.

HOPE FOR DECISION
"The amount of time lost through dispersal of industry would be enormous," one official said. "The Russians could sit and watch us ruin ourselves."

There is some hope around the department that a decision on a new site will be made before the end of this year. A new structure, whether one immense building or several buildings joined by pass-

LONDON (CP)—Canada's emergence from the wings of the world theatre into a position closer to the main actors is commented upon editorially by the Manchester Guardian.

"At several dramatic moments in international affairs in this agitated year Canada has crossed the stage as a noticeable, though not primary, actor," says the Liberal newspaper.
