Let's Talk It Over

A recent news item had it that a group of teachers on Prince Edward Island have gone on record as in favor of being paid in twelve monthly installments, instead of ten, as at present. This would mean, we presume, that teachers would be paid only five-sixths of their annual salary by the end of June, and would get the other sixth in two equal installments at the end of July and of August. As a fellow teacher, we'd like to propose an alternative scheme. Say a teacher is now getting \$100 per month from the government. This would give the whole undertaking a definite vicer "Captain Kidd" atmosphere. It seems to us a bunk in the bush should be worth two in the hands of the Government, especially if we couldn't get our eager, clutching hands on it till the end of July and August. Then, if in the middle of the term, you were suddenly overwhelmed by a desire to waste your substance in riotous living, or even meet with some other emergency which required ready cash, all you would have to do is dig down-under the tree. This scheme, a creation born of sudden impulse, may not meet with favor by the teaching body, but at any rate, we believe that the sooner you can get your hands on money in this mercenary world, the better. If anyone asks us: when do you want to be paid, Tuesday or Wednesday? We'd reply without hesitation: "Wednesday, if that's the best you can do, but how about making it Monday?"
