

S'side Boy Undergoes Rare Heart Operation

A Summerside boy, 10-year-old Edgar Yeo, underwent a rare major heart operation Tuesday at St. Vincent's Hospital, Los Angeles, California. He was under anaesthetic for six hours. Reports to members of the family in Summerside last night indicated there would be a three-day period of uncertainty.

The boy is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Yeo of Summerside. The mother accompanied Gerald to hospital. There are ten children in the family, the eldest of which is 17-year-old Anita who is keeping house while her mother is absent.

The father is a carpenter by trade.



The surgeon agreed to take the case after he had contacted Lehigh Clinic in Canada where Edgar has been under the care of doctors for two years.

"The hospital has made arrangements for me to make monthly payments to cover medical expenses there, but my problem now is to get the 20 pints of blood for the Red Cross blood bank to replace those which will be used in the operation," De Rosa said.

He has contacted several civic groups in the Valley with requests for donations, but more are needed.

"If any individuals or members of clubs in the Valley can contribute to the blood bank, I wish they would contact me," De Rosa requested.

De Rosa, who owns an appliance and television store in North Hollywood, says his own heart is in medicine, for he was a pre-medical student of Brandeis University, Waltham, Mass., and at Tufts College, Medford, Mass. "All I want is to see the boy's life saved," he said.

"Sacrifices? Any I might be making now are relatively small. All I am giving up is money. And I can replace that," De Rosa commented.

New Firm Planning 20-Unit Motel Building At S'Side

A company being formed in Summerside expects to build a 20-unit motel on the old nurses' home property on Central Street. The company will be known as the Linkletter Motel Ltd.

The provincial board of directors of the company are: Charles Linkletter, Marilyn Linkletter, Ethel Jean Muttart, R. Alex. Home and R. S. Hinton, Q. C., all of Summerside. In corporation will be applied for.

The building will be constructed of brick or concrete blocks and steel and will have a lobby office and canteen space in addition to the twenty units. It will be modern in every way. It will also have provision for sample rooms in the basement.

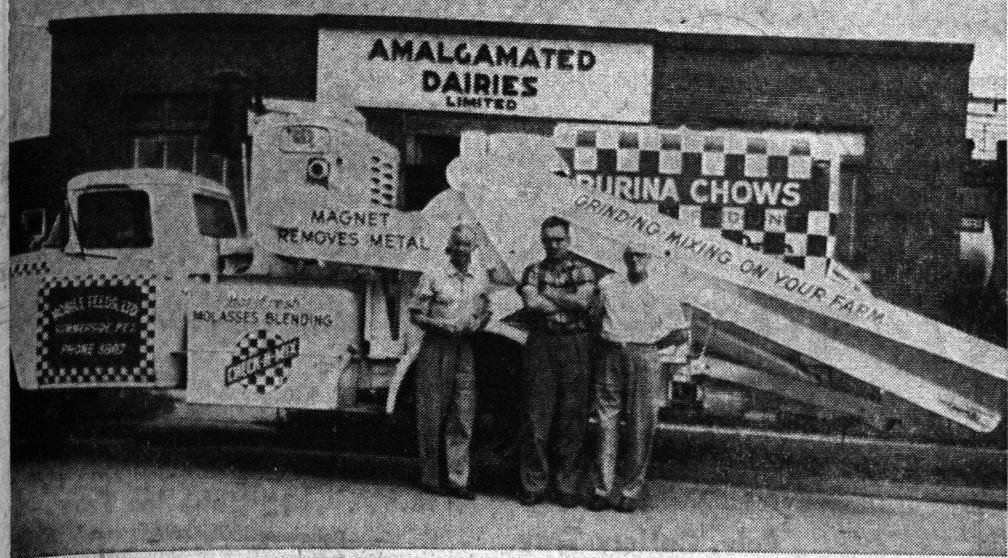
The company will have an authorized capital of \$90,000 of which \$65,000 will be paid up, according to a prospectus which has been issued by the promoter. A provincial government loan of \$40,000 is being obtained under the plan whereby the government assists in the development of facilities for the tourist industry. Common stock will be issued to the amount of \$20,000 and an issue of preferred stock in the amount of \$45,000 with interest at the rate of 6-1-2 per cent will be placed on the market locally. Par value of the preferred stock is \$10 a share. Monies received in payment of shares will be held in the joint custody of Charles Linkletter and T. Earle Hickey, C. A., until required for capital purposes.

Feed Mill On Wheels Offers New Service To Farmers

A new farm service that brings a complete feed processing plant right into customers' farmyards has been started in the Summerside area by J. A. MacGregor, Feed Service Ltd., of Summerside.

The new "mill on wheels" offers a time-saving service to local farmers and feeders who want to utilize their own grains and roughages for feeding livestock and poultry, according to James MacGregor, the owner. The idea, he said, is to take the mill to the farmers having to take his grain to the mill.

The mobile unit, first of its type on Prince Edward Island, is built by the Daffin Manufacturing Company of Lancaster, Pa. It grinds all farm grown grains and roughages according to the farmer's specifications, mixes the ground material with feed concentrates, and blends in fresh liquid molasses to produce any desired formula. The truck-borne mill is powered by its own 100 hp Diesel engine.

ARRIVED MONDAY

capacity of 10 tons per hour. It has a 16 1-2 inch screen, and the mixer has a capacity of 1 1-2 tons. The molasses, 1 1-2 ton in volume, is metered into the feed mixer in pounds. The entire unit, weighing 19,000 pounds, is mounted on a three-ton truck.

CONVENIENCE STRESSED
The operator will be Louis Gaudet, of Summerside, who has just returned with the machine after completing the operator's course at the manufacturing headquarters in Pennsylvania.

Mr. MacGregor says farmers will find it more convenient and economical to have their feed formulas processed right on their farms. In the past they have had to load their grain, truck them to the feed mill, unload them, wait until the feed was prepared, load it again, take it back to the farm, and unload it into feed bins.

ed Dairies Ltd., Ralph Caseley, district manager of Ralston Purina Co. Ltd., and Mr. MacGregor. A supply truck will accompany the mobile mill which will operate on a route schedule covering the area served by the MacGregor firm.

The mill is also capable of grinding hay and blending it with molasses.

An air unloader with the machine is capable of putting the mixed feed into bins as distant as 30 feet. A strong magnet in the machine also removes any metal which might have been in the farmer's grain supply.

The Federal Government will construct a new ship at the end of Holman's Wharf in Summerside for the use of local fishermen, it was learned Tuesday. News of the project was received from Dr. O. H. Phillips, M.P. by Dr. Hubert McNeill, president of the East Prince Progressive Conservative Association.

Dr. Phillips in a letter said: "The Department officials have investigated this matter and an amount of \$2,200 has been authorized for the construction of this work at the outer end of the wharf. It is expected that this work should be commenced in the not too distant future."
