- 3 shredded peccans
- green peppers
- 2 medium-size, peeled onions, sliced
- 1/4 c. sliced celery
- 1/4 tsp. garlic powder
- 6 c. cooked converted rice (2 1/2 c. raw rice)

Order liver skinned and sliced 1/4" thick. Dust with flour. Make a light coating all over. Fry quickly (about 8 min.) in margarine or chicken fat, adding salt and pepper as it cooks. Remove liver and set it aside to keep warm.

Into pan in which liver was cooked, put tomato, green peppers, onions, celery and garlic powder; stir together. Cook-stir often until tender, and blended about 10 min.

This is the Creole Sauce. On heated large platter, make border of hot, cooked converted rice. Center this with liver; top with Creole Sauce. Garnish of parsley spriglets, if desired.

## STRAWBERRY WHIP

- 1 pkg. strawberry-flavored gelatin
- 1/4 c. hot water
- Juice 1/2 lemon
- 1 c. thawed frozen strawberries and juice
- 1 large egg white

Dissolve gelatin in hot water. Add lemon juice. Stir together and refrigerate until beginning to thicken - about 30 min. Then beat until frothy. Fold in strawberries; and then egg white, beaten stiff. Turn into qt. mold. Refrigerate again until firm, about 2 1/2 hr. Unmold and serve, if desired, garnished with sour cream "as is" or slightly sweetened.

## TIME-SAVING TIP FROM THE CHEF

Instead of using a large mold for the preceding Strawberry Whip, spoon it into 6 (5 oz.) custard cups, and refrigerate 1 hr.; then unmold. Saves 1 1/2 hr. waiting time. Et viola!

## Vehicle Deaths Up For October

OTTAWA (CP)—Motor vehicle traffic accidents took 516 lives in October, an increase of more than nine per cent from the toll in October, 1964, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported today.

The October, 1965, figure was incomplete. Information was not available from Saskatchewan, the bureau said.

With that exception, there were 35,274 accidents, with 14,155 persons injured. In October, 1964, with figures including Saskatchewan returns, there were 31,638 accidents, in which 472 were killed and 13,224 injured.

Death toll by provinces in October, with October, 1964, figures in brackets: Newfoundland 6 (4); Prince Edward Island 7 (4); Nova Scotia 24 (29); New Brunswick 22 (21); Quebec 156 (181); Ontario 175 (124) Manitoba 29 (20); Alberta 41 (44); British Columbia 55 (45); and The Yukon and Northwest Territories, 1 (0).

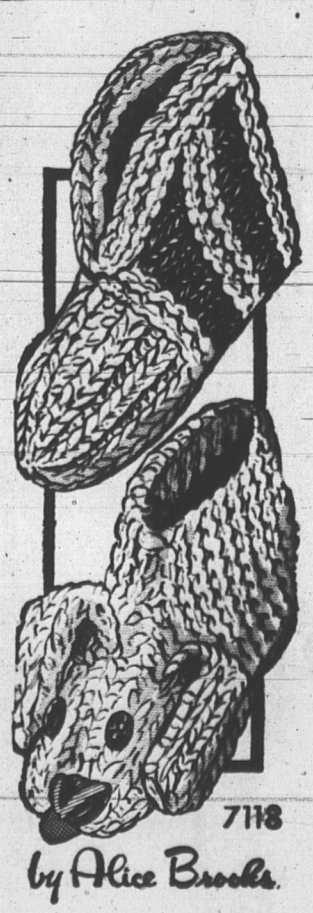
### A Farm Trapline Landed One Silvery Fox Today

### Mental Breakdown Feared By Foster-Home Mother

DEAR MARY HAWORTH: I am 60 and have been a foster-home mother for 12 years. I have an excellent record with a private agency.

She works for the deputy chief of intelligence and has the soft voice and buttoned-up lip to go with the delicate job. Before this she worked as a secretary for four years in the Atomic Energy Commission and is so top-secret conscious she won't even give her age. It's probably around a cozy 25.

But I am about to crack up mentally from complete boredom with the daily routine of crying babies, meal planning, laundry, etc.

Her roommate, Janie Coffman, 27, of Council Bluffs, Iowa, interjected: "It's a lawless world anyhow. Those boys work so hard all day and part of the night they're bushed. So do we and we're bushed!"

There are days, when the weather is bad, that I never see or talk to an adult, until my husband comes home from work. His only interest is dinner, a look at the news and off to bed, as his work is manual and heavy for a person his age.

"I used to think in terms of a tall, blonde athlete," she said with a giggle. "Now, I'm not so sure. I guess I'm not so fitfully, if I find the right one."

My only hobby is reading, which can become tiresome with nobody around to share a discussion of books and articles.

Joan made it pretty clear she's going to be thinking of the right one some place else, in due time.

My married daughter wants me to keep her baby while she works. But the thought of a nine months old baby, in addition to the 20-months-old toddler I have now gives me a perpetual headache.

Meaning, the girls live in a sweltering, dusty day-time and a hot, tired night-time in an apartment where "you just never seem to be able to get anything done."

I tried volunteer work, but the need in that field is in hospitals, children's agencies and with the aged, where the personnel are too busy for more than a passing greeting, after assigning you to your post.

"No matter what you want done, it seems too difficult for the Vietnamese," said Janie. "But that's all part of the beautiful little frustrations."

I would like to return to college on a non-credit basis to study my favorite subjects: English and Literature. My husband thinks it foolish to return to school. My daughter will be opposed, because it will upset her plans.

Janie's been here three years, Joan about half that long. They're not hankering for a boat home.

My questions: 1. Should I let the child placement agency know how I feel and let them find another home for the child? 2. Should I proceed with plans to do what I feel I need to do for myself?

As for fighting off the men, that happens seldom—probably because there are just so many of them around there's safety in the numbers.
