IN MEMORIAM

MRS. THOMAS NOONAN

On Monday, July 31st, 1950, the Angel of Death removed from this earthly sphere, one whose memory will long be cherished by relatives and friends in the person of Mrs. Thomas Noonan of Richmond, at the age of sixty-one years.

The late Mrs. Noonan was formerly Patricia Laughlin of Sherbrooke, and had been a very efficient school teacher before her marriage.

She came to Richmond as a bride thirty-five years ago, and by her steady thrift and perseverance, helped to build up one of the finest and most comfortable homes in the community. During her residence in Richmond she was highly esteemed by all who knew her.

Although not enjoying the best of health for some time, yet she was a very active member of the Catholic Women's League and a promoter of the League of the Sacred Heart and took a great interest in any movement in church and community.

The Altar in the Immaculate Conception Church was frequently adorned by flowers from her garden, which were in full bloom at the time of her death.

Mrs. Noonan entered the Prince County Hospital, two weeks previously to her death, but all that medical skill and tender nursing could do, was of no avail, and God called her to his Heavenly Home. During her illness, she was frequently visited by her pastor Rev. Leonard McDonald, who administered to her, the last rites of the Holy Catholic Church.

She leaves to mourn her death and vacancy in the home, her loving husband and one son, Walter, the homestead and two daughters, Mrs. Henry Blanchard and Mrs. Robert LeClair, both of Charlottetown; also nine grand children. She will be greatly missed by her little grand daughter Patricia Ann LeClair, who during her mother's illness was tenderly cared for by her grandmother.

She is also survived by two sisters: Mrs. Percy Weeks, St. Eleanor's, and Mrs. James Condon, Richmond; and three brothers: Walter, Edward and Raymond of Sherbrooke. A sister Mrs. Major McDonald predeceased her two years ago.

On Wednesday, August 2nd, the funeral was held in the Immaculate Conception Church, Wellington. The beautiful casket was carried from her late residence by the pallbearers: Ebba Praught, Emmett McNeill, Laughlin Kilbride, John E. Cameron, Linus McDonald and Frank I. Gallant under the guidance of Undertaker Bowness.

The members of the Catholic Women's League marched in a body, followed by a large number of relatives and friends who came to pay their last tribute of respect to one who all held dear. The funeral Mass was celebrated by the pastor Rev. L. McDonald whom also conducted the services at the grave. Rev. Ronald Delaney, C. S. R., a friend of the deceased was present in the Sanctuary. The sympathy of the community goes to Mr. Noonan and family in their irreparable loss.

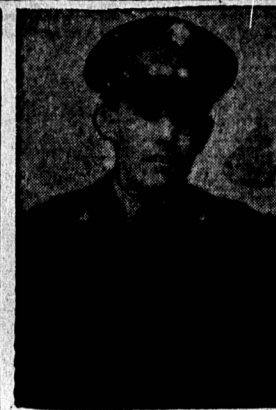

Frost Costly To Sask. Farmers

REGINA, Sept. 6 — (CP) — August frost in Saskatchewan caused wheat farmers a loss of about \$160,000,000, the Saskatchewan Pool Elevators indicated.

The bumper wheat crop suffered at least 25-per-cent damage by the unseasonable cold which spread southeastward from Northern Alberta, the Pool Elevators said in a

weekly crop report. In areas of most severe damage, many fields will have to be abandoned. The Dominion Bureau of Statistics Aug. 15 estimated Saskatchewan's spring wheat crop at 326,000,000 bushels. A reduction by one-quarter would indicate that the crop now will be 81,500,000 bushels smaller or 244,500,000.

Today's international wheat agreement price for class two wheat on Winnipeg Grain Exchange was \$1.92. At this price, farmers would have lost about \$160,000,000 through frost destruction of 81,500,000 bushels, less freight and storage costs.
