

Jim Coes Well Known Milton Farmer Dies

James Coes, MM. ED. 72, soldier, farmer and sportsman died in the P.E.I. Hospital Saturday morning.

A veteran of two world wars, he was widely known throughout the province. He was captain of the Guard of Honor (P.E.I. Highlanders, B I a k Watch) on his visit to the province of His Majesty, the late King George VI in 1939.

Born at Watchung, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Coes, he took an active part in many community activities and between them was retained an interest in soldiering, holding a commission with the Prince Edward Island Highlanders. (Black Watch).

In World War One Mr. Coes served, along with a number of other Island volunteers, with the 5th and 6th Mounted Rifles. He and his late brother, Wallace, were held in high repute as snipers in the 5th Brigade. Wallace was killed in action.

Mr. Coes was awarded the Military Medal in the Ypres Campaign. He was wounded but later returned to the front with the 25th Battalion. He was re-

SDU-PWC Students Set For Blood Battle

St. Dunstan's University and Prince of Wales College each have new blood donor chairmen in the persons of Stephen Joyce of Montreal, a Junior at SDU, and Robert Bentley of Parkdale, a fourth year student at PWC. Both are in the midst of organizing new competitions for "blood donor supremacy" not only among the various classes but also between the two colleges.

The special "Centennial Year" trophy pictured above which was put up for competition at both the spring and fall Red Cross blood donor clinics in Charlottetown between the Freshmen and Sophomores at SDU, and 3rd and 4th years at PWC, was won by SDU with a 43 per cent result at the spring clinics, PWC had a 38 per cent response.

Stephen Joyce and Robert Bentley met last night to review the terms of the competition and decided to carry it out on the same date last spring.

According to Steve Joyce, the inter-college competition at SDU will be set up along the same lines as formerly among the eligible students in Freshmen, Sophomore, Junior and Senior years. A new SDU trophy was awarded for the first time about 10 days ago to the Senior class for their high percentage of attendance at last spring's clinic.

A different type of competition was devised at PWC last April when the boys challenged the girls to see which would have the larger number in attendance at the blood donor clinics. On this occasion the girls came out "on top," and as a penalty the boys had to act as "slaves" to the girls for a day.

Robert Bentley said last night that this type of competition will be repeated at PWC again this fall but that the boys would make every effort to "reverse" the spring results, and take the trophy from the girls who presently have it in their possession.

This week's three day series of Red Cross blood donor clinics in Charlottetown will get underway with a special clinic at SDU gymnasium on Tuesday afternoon, Sept. 29, with an objective of at least 225 donors.

Two Injured In Collision

One man was hospitalized and a child suffered minor injuries when two cars were involved in a head-on collision near Cherry Valley about 12 miles east of Charlottetown on the Trans-Canada Highway Saturday afternoon.

RCMP said the drivers involved were Joseph Saulnier of Sault Ste. Marie, N.S. and Wilbur McDonald, of Lorne Valley, P.E.I. Sent to the Prince Edward Island Hospital for observation was MacDonald, 27, the three-year-old son of Mr. Saulnier. Raymond, was treated for facial cuts, RCMP said.

Mr. MacDonald's injuries were not serious, and it is expected he will be released from hospital shortly, RCMP said Sunday evening.

Both vehicles were reported to be extensively damaged in the collision. The accident happened about 2 p.m.

WHEREAS it is fitting that an opportunity should be afforded the people of Prince Edward Island properly to celebrate the occasion of the visit of Her Majesty the Queen and His Royal Highness the Duke of Edinburgh to this Province;

NOW KNOW YE that by and with the advice and consent of Our Executive Council for Prince Edward Island WE DO by this Our Proclamation order and declare Wednesday, the seventh day of October, one thousand nine hundred and sixty-four to be a public holiday throughout this Province, of which all persons concerned are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF We have caused these Our Letters to be made Patent and the Great Seal of Prince Edward Island to be hereunto affixed.

At Our Government House in Our City of Charlottetown, this twenty-second day of September in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and sixty-four and in the thirteenth year of Our Reign.
