## Air Cadet President To Speak At 'side

President of the Air Cadet League of Canada, Ivan B. Quinn of Vancouver, left Ottawa this week, on a speaking tour of the Atlantic Provinces, on behalf of the Royal Canadian Air Cadets.

Mr. Quinn will attend the annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island Provincial Committee, Air Cadet League of Canada on Oct. 9 at Summerside.

Laughlin will be in the chair, delegates from across the province will hear reports, elect new officers and prepare for continued Air Cadet activity in P.E.I.

Air Cadet League national president Mr. Quinn and an official headquarters party will attend annual meetings of the league in Moncton, N.B., Halifax, N.S., and St. John's, Nfld., besides Summerside.

As principal speaker at each provincial meeting, Mr. Quinn will interpret national policies of the dominion-wide organization and discuss future plans for the training of some 28,000 air cadets at present enrolled in 385 squadrons across Canada.

## Heartfelt Respect For Queen Impresses U.S. Newsmen

The Royal Visit to Charlottetown has produced many visible instances of the loyalty and love that Canadians have for Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth.

But among those from outside the country, the events which have taken place in the past two days have probably produced some of the most lasting impressions, as evidenced by the remarks made by a long-time newspaperman from Tennessee.

The unidentified newsmen was heard to state "Never in my career have I known or seen my message to be received and treated with so much sincer-

ity respect, which is obviously right on the hearts of the people."

He also stated that during his career he had been present on countless presidential tours and functions in the United States as well as numerous occasions involving other prominent personages from all over the world.

"But this Royal Visit," he

said "has impressed me more than anything I have previously experienced."

**VETERAN NEWSMAN DIES**

## Levesque Reiterates Visit View

QUEBEC (CP) — Rene Levesque, Quebec's minister of natural resources, said Wednesday the Queen's visit to Quebec City this weekend is "not opportune."

He also had sharp words for newspaper reporters assigned to cover the royal visit, saying they were doing their best to "create an incident" around his statements.

Mr. Levesque was questioned during a break in the regular cabinet meeting about remarks he made during an interview with a United States television network (NBC).

Asked if he still felt the same way, Mr. Levesque replied: "I have said 10 times that I find the visit of the Queen to Quebec is not opportune and I still believe it."

Frederic Levesque, when questioned about the visit, said he had no comment. "I only say that I believe she will be very welcome."
