Family Farm is Needed Says Liberal Candidate

Thomas Kichham, Kings County Liberal candidate, told a large audience at Morell Community Hall last night that the family farm is indispensable to our provincial economy and that a new Liberal government would restore the farmer to his former prosperity and make his financial returns comparable to workers in other industries.

Over 200 people from all parts of the 2nd district attended the enthusiastic meeting, which was chaired by Aldous MacKenzie, district president.

Mr. Kichham also presented several Liberal policies for the future, and that the Alvin Hamilton, federal minister of agriculture, answer in Morell last week was "a mangled potato policy."

Dr. L.M. Bonnell presented several features of the Liberal policy, especially the complete medical plan, increased and contributory pensions, extension of family allowances and the Liberal educational policy of scholarships and loans. He stated that 87 scholarships of \$1,000 each would be available to P.E.I. students each year, and interest free loans to other worthy and needy students.

Dr. Bonnell pointed out that Canada today requires a leader like L.B. Pearson, in whom all the countries of the world have complete confidence.

R.M. Jones, Charlottetown, was elected a member of the national board of directors of the Canadian Cancer Society at a grand council of the national society held last week in Montreal.

In addition to Mr. Jones, who is president of the Prince Edward Island Division of the Cancer Society, the following other delegates were also in attendance: C.W. Peters, provincial vice-president; F.J. MacDonald, provincial grand council member; and the executive secretary, Mrs. M. Estelle Dennis.

F.H. Brown, Vancouver, presided over the annual meeting and also the sessions of grand council.

W.H. Beaton, past president of the P.E.I. Division was one of four recommended for honorary life membership in the society, the others being: R.B. Blackford, B.C.; T.J. Dalton, Newfoundland; and Frank Rowe, Q.C., Nova Scotia.

Delegates returned over the weekend, and have stated that the meetings were very well attended, interesting and informative, with reports of the various national committees showing considerable progress being made in the field of cancer detection and research, and also showing increased welfare services being provided for victims of this disease.

A highlight of the sessions was an address by Dr. R.W. Scott, of London, England. Extensive discussion was held in regard to the recent release from the Royal College of Physicians, concerning the effects of smoking on general health, and its connection with lung cancer. Decision was made to launch an "all-out" Canadian

wide attack on teen-age smoking.

F.H. Brown was re-elected as national president, and E.A. Gardner, Toronto, Maurice Fox, Montreal and Gordon B. Grant, Regina as vice-presidents.

It is expected that the next sessions of this national body will be in Winnipeg, in June of 1963.

LOCAL ELDERLY SDU ALUMNUS DIES

A former graduate of St. Dunstan's University in Charlottetown, John Allan MacDonald, died recently in Vancouver. He was 90. Mr. MacDonald had been living in Vancouver since his retirement from the University of Saskatchewan in 1930.

Professor MacDonald was a native of Rock Barr, P.E.I., and was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Donald MacDonald. He was married to the former Isabel MacDonald, P.E.I., who predeceased him two years ago.

He was one of the earliest appointees to the faculty of the University of Saskatchewan in Saskatoon and received his master's degree from Harvard University and his Bachelor of Arts degree from Laval University.

At the University of Saskatchewan, Prof. MacDonald became head of the modern languages department and shortly afterwards he became first head of the French department. He was the author of a French grammar that was used at the university and also in schools of Prince Edward Island. He also wrote a manual of French pronunciation.

He is survived by a sister, Mrs. Margaret Allen, in Vancouver. The funeral was held in Vancouver.

USE OF SLAG IS SUGGESTED

Sidley J. Simon, managing director of Trans World Slag and Metals, Halifax, was in Charlottetown last week to lay the ground work for the promotion of the use of slag in industry.

Mr. Simon has come two million tons of slag at two abandoned steel mill sites in Nova Scotia. Slag is steel plant waste material.

Mr. Simon noted that a slag could be used here primarily as fill for highways, driveways, piers and other jobs, by the contracting companies. He said that the price of slag would easily compete with the cost of crushed rock brought in from the mainland and would make as good or a better road base. It is also used in concrete products, and he noted.

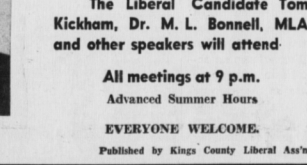

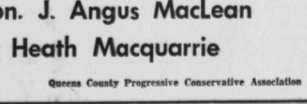

(Continued from page 1) first lack of the coalition will be to appoint a single Laotian delegation to sign the declaration of the recent Geneva conference on Laos.

The delegation was expected to travel to the Swiss city in late June or early July, Tass said.

The agency said Souvanna will fly to the royal capital of Luang Prabang Thursday to report to King Savang Vatthana, who will confirm the cabinet in a ceremony June 19.

Avtar Singh of India, chairman of the Canadian - Indian-Polish treaty commission, said the commission will supervise the removal of foreign troops from Laos within 75 days after the coalition government takes office, as specified in the Geneva agreement.

JAPANESE TO TEST

TOKYO (Reuters) — The Japanese government said Monday it will send a survey vessel to King Savang Vatthana, one of the Pacific test for radioactivity from current U.S. nuclear tests.

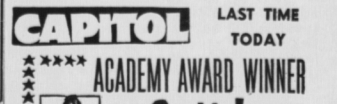
