Mayor W.A. Currie officially welcomed the Natick Peewee hockey team, the parents, and officials at a banquet tendered by the town last evening at the Tartan Restaurant. Master of ceremonies was Robert Schurman.

Mayor Currie, who accompanied the Summerside Peewees to Natick last winter, extended a cordial welcome and said "This is a privilege I've been looking forward to because anyone who accompanied our boys to Natick last year retained fond recollections of the wonderful reception, gracious hospitality and the fine way in which we were treated."

His Worship said he had hoped Natick's Mayor Frank McGee would be able to make the trip and had written him personally but he was unable to do so. Mayor Currie told the enthusiastic gathering that "hockey forms part of our year-round sports program as I believe it does yours. There's an old saying," he continued that goes "better to be building boys than mending men."

Mr. Schurman introduced each Natick player who received a memento, a wallet with chain, of their visit to Summerside. Each adult visitor also received a gift from his Worship.

Charles Ballem, Physical Education Director at Summerside High School was also slated to address the banquet but had to leave early due to prior commitments. Others at the head table included Mrs. Currie, Sidney Forman, a member of the committee who arranged the visit, and Jack Jennings, coach of the comets. Also introduced to the gathering was G. Lorne Monkley, M.L.A. and minor hockey coaches Henry Landry and Grant Grady.

Cpl. William Roberts of the RCMP crime detection laboratory in Sackville, also gave evidence.

It is expected that three more Crown witnesses will be called by Crown prosecutor, George R. McMahon before the hearing concludes next March 14.

Tignish Woman Fined \$200 On Liquor Sale

SUMMERSIDE — After the evidence of three Crown witnesses has been given yesterday before Prince County Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald Lottie Keough, of Tignish was found guilty of keeping intoxicating liquor for sale and assessed a fine of \$200 or three months in jail.

At an earlier sitting of the court two young men, Joseph Oswald Petre and Roger George Arsenault, of Howland, testified that they went to Tignish on Sunday, Oct. 29, and there they purchased four bottles of beer from the accused.

Both told of being apprehended shortly after by Const. Peter Boros, of the Alberton RCMP detachment, and going back to the Keough residence where they both pointed out the accused as being the person who sold them the beer.

Defence attorney, J. Watson MacNaught, QC, deplored the action of taking the permits and called their seizure "a persecution." He did not call any witnesses.

In passing sentence on the accused, Magistrate MacDonald, said that there could be no doubt that a sale had taken place and therefore he was finding her guilty.

Crown Prosecutor, George R. McMahon conducted the case for the Crown.

Candidate Issues Statement

Following nomination Tuesday of two candidates for the Summerside mayoralty and six for the three council seats, Herbert Schurman, the last of the candidates to enter the contest, issued a statement yesterday concerning his candidacy for councillor in the east ward.

Mr. Schurman said that "during the six years 1946 to 1952 that I was a member of the Summerside town council I served on all committees. Since that time committees have been done away with, which I feel has been a move in the wrong direction."

"I heartily endorse the committee system where your councillor has a better inside view of town affairs in general. I am in favor of wise expansion, but we must remember at all times the tax payers who are paying the shot. They must be seriously considered before any large or reckless spending is made. This is the thought I have in mind in accepting nomination."

The election will be held next Tuesday, Feb. 27.
