Dear L.L.: This is indeed a strange sounding problem. One's first asphalt impression is that your aunt and uncle seem almost inhumanly unfeeling, leaving the paralyzed grandpa alone inside a locked house all day, so that teenage grandchildren can't get to her for friendly visits.

On second thought, however, one reflects that maybe they locked door precautions aren't as heartless as the first impression suggests.

If teenage children were given the run of the house, ostensibly to see bedfast grandpa, without adult supervision during the day, they might innocently precipitate harm of sorts that could be very serious. For example, they might see the opportunity, under grandpa's roof but out of her sight, to contain appropriate chopped wicnacs.
