

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Oct. 14.

The Dublin correspondent of the Times confirms the report that the Government intends to prosecute the Land League leaders and says it is expected the proceedings will be on an extensive scale. No actual steps have been taken, but the threatened blow cannot be long suspended.

LONDON, Oct. 12.

Mr. Froude has written to an Irish gentleman a letter which is printed in the Times to-day. He says:—"The present state of things cannot last and the agitation will probably oblige the Government to call Parliament together early, perhaps for a November session. They will then bring in a bill to satisfy the Parnell party, and the House of Lords will throw it out. Then there will be an appeal to the country. So far I see no further. I do not know what answer the constituencies will give. Ireland and the Irish people may still be safe if we show that we are not afraid; that we will at least try to be just, and that one function of justice is to punish crime. If Messrs. Gladstone and Forster have their way, then civil war, which the Prime Minister spoke of, is, I think, inevitable. I am greatly attached to the Irish people. I wish to save them from the fate which surely awaits them if they are again brought into collision with this country."

A man named Heffernan, a plasterer of Clonbur, and another named Spencer, steward to a neighboring nobleman, have been arrested in connection with the murder of Lord Mountmorris.

MADRID, Oct. 14.

Calixto Garcia was liberated from the Castle of Alicante on Tuesday by order of the Government, in consequence of a telegram from Captain General Blanco, declaring he had promised their freedom to Garcia and those who surrendered with him on condition that they reside out of Cuba. Garcia arrived here on Wednesday at the office of the Minister for Colonies, and he will remain free on that condition.

CAPE TOWN, Oct. 14.

The Basutos sacked and burned the Government office and barracks at Maseu. Col. Bayley, with 500 men, is still besieged at that place. Carrington, with a small force, is besieged at Mafetyen. Reinforcements on the way.

VALPARAISO, Oct. 13.

Representatives of the three belligerents will meet on board of the United States man-of-war at Arica. It is understood one stipulation will be that hostilities may be continued pending negotiations. Peru, it is reported, will refuse any cessation of territory. The United States Minister has left Valparaiso for Arica to preside at the meeting.

ROME, Oct. 14.

The Pope has acceded to Cardinal Nina's request to be relieved of the Secretaryship of State on account of ill health. It is stated Monsignor Jacobina will succeed him.

UNITED STATES.

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 14.

Additional returns last night and this morning show about the same ratio of gains. The Republican majority on the State ticket will not fall short of 7,000. Congress will stand eight Republicans, five Democrats. The Republicans have a majority in both branches of the Legislature.

BOSTON, Oct. 14.

Advices received up to a late hour this morning show that the Republican majority in Ohio will reach 22,000. Fifteen of the twenty Congressmen are Republicans, a gain of six.

In Indiana the Republicans gain two Congressmen. They also have a majority in both branches of the Legislature, insuring a Republican successor to United States Senator McDonald. Mr. Porter's majority for governor will be between seven and eight thousand.

Returns from West Virginia show Republican gains in many counties, but the Democratic majority will probably not fall below 8,000. The constitutional amendments probably were adopted.

CINCINNATI, Oct. 14.

The collection of news both at Columbus and Indianapolis was suspended before mid night by the central committees. Not much else was done by others. The Republicans are now claiming a majority of 8,000 and a majority of the Legislature.

The Enquirer of this city says: "The effect of the Ohio and Indiana elections upon the Democracy of the Union will certainly be as invigorating as was the effect of Maine in September upon the Republicans. Four years ago the Democrats lost Ohio and carried Indiana by only 5,000 votes and still elected a President. The vote of Indiana is not needed to elect Hancock. The vote of Ohio was not expected in order to secure the election of Hancock."

NEW YORK, Oct. 14.

Martin Lynch, who lost all his savings in betting on Indiana election, cut his throat to-day and died.

Democratic National Executive Committee is in session this afternoon at Democratic headquarters. Among those present are Senator Barnum and Messrs. Scott, Pa.; Smalley, Vt.; Hewitt, N. Y.; Barnes, Ga.; and Cleveland, N. J. Result of October elections and prosecution of campaign are, it is understood, subjects under consideration.

The Sackville (N.B.), and the Yarmouth (N.S.), Exhibitions are reported in the St. John papers. The Sun says the cattle were about as good as those shown at Charlotte-town; but the nags were not so good.

MR. GEORGE SWEANOR, of Montreal, claims to have discovered a method of dividing the electric light, by which it is adapted to household use. The inventor asserts that he can supply the light for domestic use at one-third the price of gas.

THE TURE.—There is talk of a match trotting race between "Lady Bagnall," owned by Mr. Dover, of Charlottetown, and "Annie Eichel," owned by Mr. C. A. Holstead, of this town, and controlled by Mr. S. Rand. The race if arranged will take place on the "Limewick." Both animals are said now to be suffering slightly from the "epizoo."—Moncton Times.

It is reported that Real Estate is going up steadily in Montreal. The rise is said to be equal in the value of well situated property to some thirty per cent. The appreciation is attributed to the improvement in business, the plentifulness of money and the scarcity of opportunities for its profitable investment in other directions.

FIVE prisoners in Pictou jail set a straw bed on fire, Tuesday morning, evidently expecting the jailor would go into the cell and put it out, and then, after overpowering him, they would make their escape. But the jailor "took the matter in a glance," and, letting the straw burn out, smoked the prisoners beautifully, and then drenched them with water from the engine.

THE Moncton Times remarks that there are all sorts of tricks in every trade. A few days ago a statement came down here from the Upper Provinces to the effect that the cattle trade was proving unremunerative to Ontario shippers, but a Toronto despatch of this morning says that a syndicate of Toronto cattle dealers have contracted for space in two lines of steamers for 20,000 head of cattle. The first statement may have been made to scare weak speculators, especially in the Maritime Provinces, out of the trade.

ON October the 12th was celebrated in Italy, Spain and on this side of the Atlantic, the discovery of America by the great Genoese navigator, Christopher Columbus. The Columbus Association, of New York, made careful preparation for the due commemoration of the man and the event. In twelve years more it will be four hundred years since the opening up of this new world to Europeans. No doubt that anniversary will be celebrated with due solemnity throughout both America and Europe.

REGARDING the diploma granted Mr. McLeod's horse "Blackfoot," by the Judges at the St. John Exhibition, the owner desires us to state, that he did not send his horse to St. John to compete against horses from Prince Edward Island, but he sent him to compete against New Brunswick horses, and finding that the Island horses would not be allowed to compete against the horses of New Brunswick, he locked his horse "Blackfoot" in his stall on the Exhibition grounds. While thus closed from the view of the Judges and the public a diploma was awarded Blackfoot for being an excellent animal, and second to Mr. Craswell's horse. Henry Longworth, Esq., the Island Commissioner, has sent Mr. McLeod a letter testifying that Blackfoot was locked up when the Judges made the award.
