be accused at least of violating currency regulations.

The arrest was disclosed two days after the official Communist newspaper, Szabad Nep, carried articles attacking what it said were "hostile undermining activities" carried out on behalf of the American Joint Distribution Committee.

The AJDC, a Jewish welfare organization, was banished from Hungary three years ago. It is understood that the Jewish community Stoekler headed has since administered AJDC funds sent to Hungary. The community has established homes for many aged and disabled Jews.

Stoekler appeared to be a significant addition to the roll of victims of purges with anti-Jewish overtones sweeping the Communist lands behind the Iron Curtain.

Magistrate's Court At Georgetown

Before Stipendiary Magistrate for King's County, Joseph W. MacDonald, Q.C., evidence was heard at the Court House in Georgetown on Tuesday and Wednesday, January 13 and 14 in two important excise cases, involving two residents of Dundee, King's County.

In one case an illicit still and a considerable quantity of illicit spirits, commonly known as "moonshine", was seized in scrub woodland at Dundee and in the other case a quantity of moonshine was seized in the same area.

The seizures were made on December 5, 1952, by members of the R.C.M.P. liquor squad, under Cpl. Peter Jay of the Charlottetown detachment and members of the R.C.M.P. Souris detachment, under Cpl. Lionel F. M. Strong. Cpl. Jay gave evidence in both cases on Tuesday. On Wednesday evidence was taken from several R.C.M.P. constables in the case involving the seized still. In this case the accused, a resident of Dundee also gave evidence.

The accused was represented by Mr. R. R. Bell, Q.C., of Charlottetown. Conducting the prosecution for the Crown in both cases was Mr. S. S. Hessian, Q.C., Crown Prosecutor for King's County. The cases were adjourned to Wednesday, January 21 at 1:30 p.m. at Georgetown.

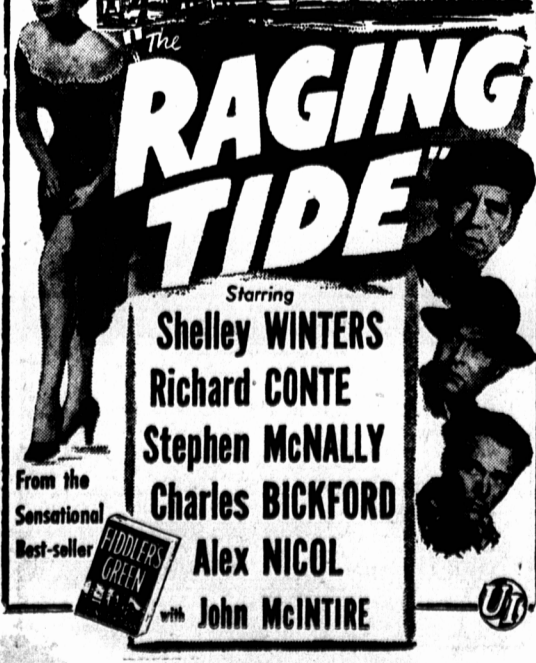

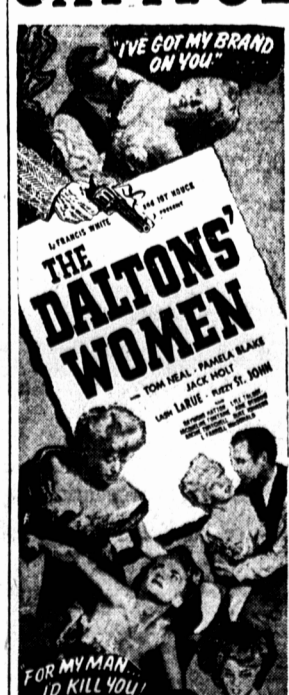

Russia Breaking Treaty on Fisheries

LONDON, Jan. 18 — (Reuters) — Russia has given Britain notice she is breaking a 1930 Anglo-Soviet treaty which allows British fishermen to fish within three miles of the Russian coast. Russia now claims territorial waters 12 miles out from shore. The Foreign Office, announcing the Russian notice Saturday, said the treaty provided either side could terminate with six months notice.

Jewish Leader In Hungary Arrested

BUDAPEST, Jan. 18 — (OP) — Hungarian police have arrested Lajos Stoekler, leader of the nation's Jewish community. The arrest, announced by the government Saturday may have been another step in the tightening of Communist control over Hungary.

Previously Istvan Bodi, a fellow-traveller and leader of the Smallholder Party, had been dismissed as premier and replaced by Communist Party boss Matyas Rakosi in what was considered a major move to consolidate Red control.
