10 More Captives To Return Today

PANMUNJOM, (AP)—The first 10 or more captives to be released by the Communists since the big Korean prisoners exchange ended Sept. 8 come out to freedom today. Allied hopes were that these few constituted a trickle that would grow into a flow of thousands of men believed held back by the Reds. But a Communist newspaper called this a "big surprise" and said the little group was among 320 men who had elected to remain under Communist rule. Those returning today simply changed their minds, the Reds said.

QUEBEC, (CP)—J. H. Downs of Lethbridge, Alta., was elected president Friday of the Amalgamated Civil Servants of Canada at the close of their 14th biennial national convention here. He succeeds H. A. Helm of Kitchener, Ont., who is retiring after holding the post for nine years. Antoine Simard of Quebec was elected first national vice-president and vice-president for Quebec. Regional vice-presidents include H. McMaster, Dorchester, N.B., representing the Maritimes. Their term of office is two years.

Standing Guard At Farm After Threats

ROCKLAND, Ont., (CP)—Police and neighbors are standing nightly guard at the farm home of John Mathurin, whose life has been threatened in three notes. The first note appeared Sept. 10, the night after Mr. Mathurin had shot at chicken thieves in his farmyard. Written in French, the note said: "You have shot at my son and wounded him. You will die on midnight Sunday." Police waited in vain at the farm, 20 miles east of Ottawa but a few minutes after police left, another note—the third—was found pinned to the door.

Mr. George Boyer, Sackville, N. B., Dominions Wildlife Branch, gave an instructive and comprehensive address on waterfowl. He illustrated by means of slides the work which his department carried out in taking inventories of the breeding population in spring-broods in August, and a total of overall count of the numbers of ducks. He explained why several methods were used during the survey, airplane, boat and on foot. He showed the overland and shoreline areas covered on this survey, and described how ducks were trapped and banded.

Mr. James Donley, Millville, N.S., past president of the Nova Scotia Fish and Game Association, gave a comprehensive report on the Atlantic Salmon Association meeting which he attended recently at Montreal. He said that a state of emergency existed respecting Atlantic salmon in that their numbers were depleting rapidly. It was necessary, he said, to employ immediate methods of conservation in order to restore Atlantic salmon to their former numbers.

Mr. Donley graphically showed the small percentage of spawners which would inevitably result, he said, in the gradual extinction of Atlantic salmon unless something were done immediately.

Several Questions Discussed. Following a brief intermission period, a discussion on several questions ensued.

The first question, the benefits to be gained by closer cooperation between governments, sportsmen organizations and individual sportsmen in matters of conservation, development and protection of our wildlife resources, was introduced by Mr. E. A. Curtis of Sydney. He was followed by Clifford Fox of Amherst and Herb Vessey of

Urge More Money For Colombo Plan

MONTREAL, (CP)—The Canadian Congress of Labor Friday accused Soviet Russia of fomenting world strife, and called on the federal government to quadruple Canada's Colombo plan contributions to \$100,000,000 a year to help maintain peace in southeast Asia. To overcome poverty and build up the under-developed countries, the 370,000-member labor body proposed also that Canada's grant to the United Nations technical assistance program be boosted to \$5,000,000 a year from \$800,000. Hammering out a wide-ranging foreign policy as a wind-up to a week-long convention, the CCL endorsed the right of free countries to strengthen their defenses and warned the government to be on guard "against appeasement in any form." But it agreed that the free world should lose no opportunity for settling the cold war. It proposed
