'LAST CHANCE' ELECTION

Dief Declares Liberals Whittling At Monarchy

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) — John Diefenbaker came into this tradition-steeped city Saturday night with the charge that the Liberal government is whittling away at the monarchy and other British traditions and the Nov. 8 election represents the last chance to stop it.

Standing before a huge Union Jack in the downtown hall where he began his 1957 campaign, the Progressive Conservative leader told his audience: "There is not going to be any second chance.

"The election will decide these things for many years to come.

"This Conservative party stands where it always stood for the maintenance of the monarchy and the preservation of these traditions for Canada."

The subject of British traditions appeared to represent a sensitive area for the 700 persons who filled the hall. They gave Mr. Diefenbaker the loudest approval when he defended his party's fight against the new maple leaf flag.

PERSPIRING IN HEAT

Perspiring in the heat of the hall and with locks of his crinkly white hair falling down over his forehead, the 70-year-old party leader leaned into the microphone and said:

"I have no apology to offer for the stand the Conservative party took on that question (the flag)—let that be clear.

"We stood alone. On the other side, the Pearson Liberals and the NDP with their one or two exceptions, and the Social Credit with the same exceptions, and the Creditists with no exceptions.

"We didn't oppose a distinctive flag, but we said it should show the heritages of both founding races and be determined by the people."

From the beginning, said Mr. Diefenbaker, he contended that the new flag "represented the beginning of steps by this government that will lead ultimately to other steps being taken."

"It was right."

Within weeks, the young Liberals of Ontario came out to abolish the monarchy, he said.

"The next step by the government was the social security cards. The coat of arms was removed because here were those who objected to the Crown.

"No, there will be no second chance."

UNION JACKS AROUND

Mr. Diefenbaker was enveloped in Union Jacks—the official provincial flag—when he arrived at the airport to be greeted by about 300 persons. Party organizers said 150 cars were in the possession that ushered him downtown with blaring horns.

There were scattered red emblems among the decorated cars but most were Union Jacks. The only maple leaf flag in sight was on the airport flag pole.

For 50 minutes Saturday night, Mr. Diefenbaker attacked the Liberal government for "the highest cost of living in our history," the "tinkering with Confederation" and its alleged lack of concern for "the average Canadian."

"I am just an average Canadian my friends."

"Why did I stay? The reason was this, I believe we had something for Canada.

POSES QUESTION

"What is there to gain for me, an average Canadian, who has received every honor the Canadian people could give?"

"It's going to be a hard election. The prime minister says he's going to sit in silence as a Buddha in Ottawa. He'll be out."

India Likely To Test Nuclear Bomb In Year

NEW DELHI (Reuters)—India is likely to explode a nuclear device in perhaps a year's time, competent observers here believe, although official policy at present is that the country will not make atomic weapons.

An atomic energy department spokesman has described reports of plans for a nuclear explosion as "speculation."

Official policy for the time being remains that nuclear energy will be used for peaceful purposes.

Experts have long acknowledged India's nuclear capability and Dr. H. J. Bhabha, head of the Atomic Energy Commission, has estimated that India could produce a bomb in about a year if a decision were made to go ahead.

Lennox Island Resident Dies After Stab Wounds

SOLID FUEL

Rocket Motor Given Test

HOMESTEAD, Fla. (AP)—The world's largest known solid-fuel rocket motor scored a spectacular success on its first test firing Saturday, shooting a towering pillar of white-hot flame more than 1,000 feet into the sky.

The success was a major milestone in the U.S. Space Agency program to determine whether large solid-propellant rockets can be effectively used as boosters for giant space payloads.

The rocket was a strapped down firmly in a nose-down position enabling the rocket to vent its flame upward.

After a perfect two-hour countdown, a radio signal was sent to an ignition system and the huge motor with its 840 tons of rubber-like fuel flashed to life, generating thrust of more than 3,000,000 pounds.

LAKE WINNIPEG

Sinking Leaves Eight Missing

RIVERTON, Man. (CP)—The fate of eight persons remained unknown Sunday following the wreck of the Susan E., a 75-ton fish freighter which capsized in a violent storm that struck Lake Winnipeg Friday night.

RCMP said Sunday 10 persons were aboard, adding a passenger to a total of nine given earlier. There was one known death and one known survivor.

Snow squalls and high winds lingered over the areas Saturday, hampering the search.

RCMP said the body of the Susan E.'s captain, Richard Johnson of Stonewall, Man., was recovered from the shore of Black Island, about 20 miles northeast of here and 90 miles north of Winnipeg.

The RCMP spokesman said Johnson rode a piece of wreckage along with survivor Clifford Everett, the mate.

The RCMP, who interviewed Everett said the mate pulled Johnson ashore but it appeared he had succumbed to the cold.

FLYING SERVICE

Moving To City

OTTAWA (CP)—Robert's Flying Service of Tryon, P.E.I. has been granted permission to shift operations to Charlottetown, the Air Transport Board announced Saturday.

The service is restricted to Class 4 charter operations with Group B aircraft.

Licence to operate Class 4, charter operations with Group B aircraft.

Licence to operate Class 4, groups B and C charter, and Class 7, specialty services, from Tryon is cancelled.

Robert J. McIlwaine, in applying for the licence, said most charter work now originates in the provincial capital 22 miles from Tryon and the shift to Charlottetown would mean faster public service.

TV ANNOUNCER

Opposes PM

ESPANOLA, Ont. (CP)—Television announcer Joel Alfred of Toronto was nominated Saturday as the Progressive Conservative candidate to oppose Prime Minister Pearson in Algoma East in the federal election.

Mr. Alfred, 44, announced his candidacy Sept. 23. He has no direct link with the riding held by Mr. Pearson since 1948. Mr. Alfred said he will become a property owner and resident of the riding to counter claims that he is an outsider.

Mr. Alfred was the Conservative candidate in Toronto St. Paul in the 1963 general election but was defeated by Liberal

Of Sikkim Visits N.Y.

NEW YORK (AP)—Queen Hopla of Sikkim, the former Hope Cooke of New York and Washington, arrived here Saturday night "just to see the doctors."

The queen of the tiny Himalayan state which is involved in a border dispute between India and China, said she would be in New York two or three days. She said she had come at this time because:

"Tensions in Sikkim seem to be much more relaxed now. Everyone at home is very calm, and all seems to be going very well now."

She would not elaborate on the medical reasons for her visit. A friend said the former debutante was not suffering from anything of a serious nature.

Visit To Gypsies Camp By Pope Is Record

POMEZIA, Italy (AP)—Pope Paul VI's visit to a gypsy camp in Pomezia, Italy, was a record for the pontiff. He spent nearly three hours with the hand-clapping crowd. The sight of him joining in made them clap all the louder.

Despite day-long downpours, the Roman Catholic pontiff went into the midst of 3,000 gypsies and an equal number of visitors at the camp 25 miles south of Rome.

Gypsies, Romans, tourists, prelates and swarms of security policemen tramped through a sea of mud created by the hours of rain to see the Pope.

He stayed dry and mudless, celebrating mass for the gypsies and greeting them as "perpetual pilgrims, voluntary exiles, wanderers without rest."

MAN BEING HELD

Big Powers Get Warning

NEW DELHI (AP)—Prime Minister Lal Bahadur Shastri warned the "big powers" Sunday not to force a settlement of the India-Pakistan conflict that goes against Indian interests.

Shastri told a political meeting that India will never part with the Himalayan state of Kashmir, as Pakistan demands. Indians believed Britain and the United States support Pakistan in the dispute.

Shastri said "I hope the big powers realize that if this is their attitude they will drive us into a desperate position."

"We have demonstrated our willingness to shed our blood to maintain the sovereignty and integrity of our country and I appeal to the big powers to understand our feelings in this matter," he said.

The U.S. supported United Nations resolutions calling for a plebiscite in predominantly-Muslim Kashmir. It is widely believed in the Indian government that Washington and London favor either accession of the state to Pakistan, also predominantly Muslim, or semi-independence if one of these courses would help solve the bitter 18-year India-Pakistan quarrel.

REVEALS FEELINGS

Shastri revealed the depth of Indian feeling on this subject by stating in another speech Sunday that his government does not want to hear the UN Security Council repeat the "old talk" about Kashmir.

The UN Security Council must fully implement the current India-Pakistan ceasefire before going on to any political settlement, Shastri said, or India will have to reconsider whether or not to take part in the world body's discussions.

Pakistan already has threatened to withdraw from the UN—a more drastic step—if a "just settlement" to the Kashmir issue is not found.

MAN BEING HELD

Thant Says Ceasefire Violated

UNITED NATIONS (AP)—UN Secretary-General U Thant said Sunday night the India-Pakistan ceasefire "is not holding" and that both sides are stalling on withdrawal of troops.

The ceasefire was accepted by India and Pakistan only four days ago.

Thant sent a two-page report on the situation to the Security Council, under its resolution of last Monday demanding that India and Pakistan order a ceasefire and the subsequent withdrawal of their troops to the positions they held Aug. 5.

The report was based on information from Australian Lt. Gen. Robert Nimmo, chief UN observer.

The secretary general said: "In the Lahore Pakistan sector, particularly, the ceasefire is not holding as of Sept. 26."

MAN BEING HELD

Fighting Is Reported Along Ceasefire Line

RAWALPINDI (AP)—Pakistan said Sunday large-scale fighting has erupted along the United Nations ceasefire line on the India-West Pakistan border.

A government announcement claimed that Indian troops attacked with tanks and artillery, but were driven back with the loss of 90 men killed and 73 captured.

The alleged Indian assault was on the Fazilka front near the West Pakistan city of La-

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
