Saints Juvenile Squad Wins Maritime Ch'ship

St. Dunstan's High School hockey team under the coaching hand of Bert Steele captured the Maritime juvenile hockey championship in a three team round-robin tournament staged in Campbellton, New Brunswick on Friday and Saturday.

The Red and White team obtained the right to represent the Island in the Maritime tournament by downing Summerside in a provincial playoff. The Red and White squad blasted the western pucksters 8-3 at Civic Stadium in the first game of a two game total-goals series and then walloped the Summerside juvenile club 11-2 at the St. Dunstan's arena.

The Steele coached aggregation played both their games on Saturday against the Nova Scotia provincial champions, Windsor, and the New Brunswick champions from the host city. The Saints fought an uphill battle in their opening contest which got underway at one o'clock Saturday afternoon. Their opponents, the Nova Scotia champions, jumped into a 3-0 lead in the opening period and when the siren went to end the opening stanza the Malpeque Road students were down three big goals.

The Windsor pucksters drew first blood in the second period and took a commanding 4-0 lead in the Maritime playoff battle. At the 10 minute mark of the second period Cyril MacDonald denied the twines for the Charlottetown juvenile club and this was the signal for the Steelmen to spring to the attack.

The Saints applied the pressure in the final stages of the sandwich session and they got goals from the sticks of Billy Weatherbie and team captain Cecil MacDonald to pull within one goal of the Nova Scotia representatives before the close of the second frame.

A determined band of Charlottetown pucksters poured over the boards to start the final period in Saturday afternoon's battle and early in the final 20 minutes shifty Allan Flood found the range and brought the St. Dunstan's team on even footing with the Windsor squad. The team battled 'tooth and nail' for that all important fifth goal and at the 15 minute mark Morell's Mike Kelly blasted one to give the Saints a 5-4 triumph and a ticket into the Maritime finals, against the Campbellton team which had defeated Windsor in Friday's action.

The Saints were back on the ice at seven o'clock in the evening to face-off with the favored Campbellton juvenile club. The New Brunswick pucksters took a two goal lead on the local students and the Saints were only able to garner one marker before the close of the first period, with Mike Kelly doing the honors.

In the second frame the Bert Steele coached team tied the game when young Allan Flood beat the Campbellton netminder and the period ended with the two clubs deadlocked at 2-2. The Saints, who would be expected to be tired from their afternoon tussle, took control of the juvenile final in the third stanza when Allan Flood opened the scoring for the Red and White forces with his second marker of the night.

Campbellton tied the game, but Cyril MacDonald came through with the winning goal for the local team and Mike Kelly added an assurance marker. Brian MacIntyre denied the twines for the Saints sixth goal to put the 'icing on the cake' for the St. Dunstan's juvenile club and give them their convincing 5-3 win over the favored Campbellton representative in the Maritime juvenile finals.

This was the second championship crown for the Red and White team this season. Previous to their departure for the New Brunswick tourney the Malpeque Road students nailed down the provincial Senior 'A' Interscholastic championship by eliminating Summerside High School in a hard fought series. Northern New Brunswick captured the Maritime juvenile crown, last season.

Summerside Rink Wins Bonspiel

SACKVILLE, N.B. (CP) — A Summerside, P.E.I. rink skipped by Dan Durling Saturday night won the Maritime Junior Curling Championship here.

Durling won the title by defeating Les Brownrigg's St. Andrew's, N.B., rink 7-4 in a playoff match. Both rinks had finished regular play in the two-day bonspiel with four wins and one loss.

Fredericton finished with a 3-2 record, Amherst 2-3, and Dartmouth and Charlottetown both 1-4.

SUMMERSIDE — A goal by Dave 'Little Dave' Burke late in the third period gave Sydney C.B. Post Bombers a tough 5-4 victory over Summerside Legionnaires here Saturday in the first game of a best of three Maritime Junior Hockey Championship finals. The second game and a third if necessary will be in Sydney tonight and Tuesday respectively.

Following faulty Summerside defensive play around their net, Burke scored the clincher at 15:37, flipping the puck by Gary Sommers. Burke's winner finished off a hectic six goal period and enabled the Bombers to come from behind for the triumph.

The goal came only 24 seconds after Sydney's big John Mulvihill collected his second marker of the game to tie the score.

The outstanding comeback by Sydney overshadowed a fine performance by Summerside's Alan Gaudet who connected twice and help set up a third goal besides leading many a dangerous rush.

Sydney's Blair Joseph opened the scoring at 11:54 in a close checking first period, drilling a 20 footer past the outstretched leg of Sommers. The Bombers, for the first 7 minutes and 48 seconds, failed to get a drive on the Summerside cage.

Gary Rideout made it 2-0 on a weird goal early in the second period. Mulvihill shot the puck behind the net, then after it bounced back off the boards and over the cage in front of Sommers. Rideout swept in and quickly slammed the puck home.

Play was rough and hard hitting as the period progressed and the Legionnaires began carrying the play.

Gaudet netted his first goal on a three-on-two attack with less than five minutes left in the period. The speedster carried down right wing, manoeuvred in close and let fly a hard wrist shot that darted through Mike Novak's pads.

Dave Burke, not Little Dave, nearly gave Sydney a two goal lead near the end of the second period. He skated in alone on Sommers but lost control of the puck after electing to fake the netminder out of position.

Summerside opened up with two quick scores in the free-wheeling finale.

Gaudet stickhandled his way clear for his second goal within 38 seconds after Paul MacWilliams set him up in Bomber ice. MacWilliams in turn showed the Legionnaires ahead 3-2 on a slap shot 24 seconds later.

Prior to Sydney's tying and winning goals, Mulvihill got his first then Summerside's Bob Perry made it 4-3 on a combination play with Gaudet. Mulvihill's tying drive caught

the far corner of the net after he whirled completely around to get the shot away.
