FOR ST. JOHN'S.—The steamship Coban, Capt. Robert Fraser, called here on her way to St. John's, Newfoundland at 7.30 this morning. She had a general cargo and the following passengers: For Sydney—Miss Copeland and Mrs. Christie; for St. John's—Miss Bailey. She proceeded to St. John's this afternoon, taking a cargo which included 90 sheep shipped by Wm. Boyle, and 40 shipped by Mr. Wheatley.

GUARD OF HONOR.—A Guard of Honor, composed as follows: Garrison Artillery, 2nd Lieut., 1 Serg't., 35 Gunners; Engineers—1 Captain, 1 Serg't., 30 Sappers; 82 Battalion, 1st Lieut., 1 Serg't-Major, 1 Ser 35 Privates, with the Band of the Artillery Brigade, will receive the Governor-General at the Provincial Building on his arrival there, on Thursday, to receive the address from the City Council. The Guard of Honor will be under the command of Capt. Weeks. A salute of 19 guns will be fired from Fort Edward on His Excellency's landing, by detachments drawn from No. 1 Battery, G. A., under command of Captain H. M. Davison.

Rev. C. E. Perry, of Toronto, Grand Chaplain of Ontario, and Grand Organizer of the Orange Association of British America, preached in the Presbyterian Church, Brookfield, on Sabbath morning, and in the Methodist Church, Charlottetown, in the evening, to large congregations. He lectures this week on Tuesday and Wednesday evenings, in the country, and on Thursday evening, Oct. 23rd, in the Orange Hall, Charlottetown. He leaves here on Friday for Halifax, where he lectures on Saturday evening and preaches on Sabbath evening. On Monday he leaves for Newfoundland, and expects to return in about three weeks to deliver several lectures in P. E. Island.

DISTURBANCE ON THE RAILWAY.—Patrick Bradley and James Bradley, both of Baldwin's Station, were arrested and brought to Charlottetown this morning by Sergeant Bradley under a warrant issued by R. R. Fitzgerald, Esq., J. P. for Prince Edward Island, charging them with having created a disturbance on the train between Mount Stewart and Georgetown on the second of October, one of the days of the Exhibition in Charlottetown, and with having assaulted Allan J. McDonald the baggage master on the train. At three o'clock this afternoon the prisoners were brought before Mr. Fitzgerald for trial. Mr. Hodgson, Q. C., appeared on behalf of the Railway authorities. Mr. Unsworth, the Superintendent, and the railway employes on the train on the day in question were all present. The charge having been read to the defendants, they each pleaded guilty. Mr. Hodgson then on behalf of the prosecution, and with the consent of Mr. Unsworth, stated that he did not desire that the utmost limit of the law should be imposed on the parties in view of the fact that they had come forward and expressed regret for their conduct, and had hitherto borne good characters and belonged to respectable parents. He would be satisfied if, instead of imprisonment without the option of a fine, the magistrate would impose a fine. His Honor fined Patrick Bradley \$20 and costs or two months' imprisonment, and James Bradley \$10 and costs or one month's imprisonment. In passing sentence, Mr. Fitzgerald referred to the cases from the westward tried before him two years ago, in which the parties had, after a lengthy trial, been found guilty and imprisoned without fine. In this case it was only because of the request of Mr. Hodgson, who is the agent of the Minister of Justice in this Province, that he made the fine so light.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Ottawa Notes. Ottawa, Oct. 20. Col. Herbert, the new commander of the militia, is expected to arrive here the latter part of November.

In view of the fact that a United States expert has recommended the use of Canadian nickel for military and naval purposes, an agitation is on foot to urge the government to impose an export duty on nickel ore. The nickel mines at Sudbury are supposed to be almost inexhaustible.

Rev. Oswald Birchall, of Birksville, England, has written the Governor-General, asking clemency for his brother under sentence at Woodstock. He adduces no strong reasons.

Artillery Competition.

HALIFAX, Oct. 20. The 64-pounder shifting competitions by the Garrison Artillery, which were not held at Quebec on account of rain, came off at the drill shed to-night before Capt. Tell of the R. A. as umpire. Three detachments took part. No. 1 did a shift in 4.39, No. 2 in 5.54 No. 3 in 12.21. The "B," or go-go-you-please was done by the same teams respectively in 22.10, 6.51, and 12.14. The competition was for second and third prize, Cobourg (?) having taken first at Quebec.

The Flour Milling Industry.

MONTREAL, Oct. 20. An English syndicate has about finished negotiations for the purchase of nearly the whole of the flour milling industry of Canada. It will combine the Ogilvie Mills, which are the most extensive in the Dominion, the Lake of the Woods Milling Company's Mills, and the Hudson Bay Mills. The purchase price will be about three million dollars, two millions of which will go to Messrs. Ogilvie and the remaining million to the other two companies.

Steamer Burned.

PORT HURON, Mich., Oct. 20. The steamer Annie Young, of the Lake Superior Transit Co., was burned to the water's edge off Lexington, at nine o'clock this morning. The steamer Ed. Smith went to the rescue and took thirteen of the crew off and brought them here. The balance of the crew, eight men, took to a yawl boat and were drowned. The Annie Young was valued at \$30,000, and was bound from Gladstone to Buffalo. The insurance is unknown.

A Conference.

SYDNEY, N. S. W., Oct. 20. The conference between the striking Marine Officers and Shipowners was held today but no result was reached. The shipowners refused to discuss the question at issue, because the officers had not withdrawn from the trades council.

Paint Company Successful.

HALIFAX, Oct. 20. The Dominion Paint Company of this city is meeting with success on the Pacific Coast. It has lately received another large order for ship paint and made a shipment on Friday by the C. P. R. for Vancouver.
