Small Savings For U. S. Families By Gov't Action

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Prices on hundreds of items went down in the United States today as a result of two government actions. For most purchases, the savings will be only in pennies, but they will add up for most families to many dollars.

Excise or sales taxes go down, by an aggregate of about \$1,000,000,000 a year, on such items as stoves, refrigerators, luggage, jewelry, furs, cosmetics, sporting goods many admissions, telephone and telegraph charges, passenger fares on planes, trains and buses. The amounts of the cuts vary.

Butter prices also go down under an order by Agriculture Secretary Vincent Price reducing the level at which the government supports producer prices. The cut is expected to average around 10 cents a pound. Also in line for a cut are cheese prices, perhaps in the order of five cents a pound.

Would Consolidate Atomic Energy Activities Here

QUEBEC, (CP)—The Protestant Ministerial Association, which groups Protestant ministers in Quebec City, adopted a resolution Wednesday urging a continued ban on lotteries in Canada.

Copies of the resolution were sent to Prime Minister St. Laurent, Opposition leader, Drew, Premier Duplessis and members of Parliament for Quebec City constituencies.

The resolution said that if the federal government legalized lotteries it would show "its importance to meet its obligations without recourse to sources of revenue based on the exploitation of human weakness."
