X-Ray Checks To Be Available To Teachers At Convention

Mobile x-ray equipment of the P.E.I. Tuberculosis League will be placed in Queen Charlotte High School during the 1963 convention of the P.E.I. Teachers' Federation, April 17-19.

Frank Costello, president of the federation, said he would encourage teachers to take advantage of this convenience, as every teacher in the province must have a chest x-ray at least every two years.

Names of teachers by counties and regional schools on whom x-rays are due in 1963 will be posted.

Following the interpretation of chest films taken at the convention, a certificate will be sent to each teacher, and a copy mailed to the department of education.

The league reports no cases of active tuberculosis among school teachers have been discovered during the past two years.

It said the x-raying of adult groups has proven to be the most effective method of discovering not only contagion but also other abnormal chest conditions.

Mother Is Granted Custody Of Child By Supreme Court

The custody of the child, Marie Menasse, was awarded to Mrs. Alice Russo Menasse by Justice George R. Tweedy in Supreme Court Thursday afternoon.

In his judgment, Mr. Justice Tweedy said that all relevant factors were considered in the decision, including the common law right of the father, the very great weight described by the orders of the competent foreign courts, and the paramount interest of the child.

He referred to the testimony given by Mrs. Menasse and her former husband, Dr. Benjamin Menasse, and noted that although the case was called to show why Mrs. Menasse should not have custody of the child, such evidence was submitted.

Mrs. Menasse plans to return here to her home in Elizabethville, Katanga, the Congo, where she will live with her parents and bring up her son.

Attorneys in the case were John P. Nicholson, acting for Mrs. Menasse, and Gerald R. Foster, QC, and K.A. Mar tin, QC, acting for Dr. Menasse, who is practising dentistry in Souris.

This was the second time Mr. Justice Tweedy has ruled that the mother should have custody of the child as the appeal court had deferred the case to him

Bank Move Is Scheduled For Weekend

First steps will be taken this weekend in a major program to relocate the Bank of Montreal's Charlottetown branch in new premises on its present site in time for the 1964 centennial celebrations according to Recting G. Boyne, the manager.

Mr. Boyne said that the B of M is moving this weekend to temporary premises in the new Tweel Building on Kent Street, next to Burke Electric Ltd. The move will avoid demolition of the bank's present Grafton Street building and construction of the new premises on the same site.

The award of the contract to demolish the bank's old building, and to erect the new structure will be announced shortly.

The B of M will operate on the ground floor of the Tweel Building immediately behind the bank's present site. The temporary office has an area of more than 1,000 square feet, and is equipped with facilities equal to those in the present office so that full banking services can be provided throughout the project, Mr. Boyne said.
