concentrate our efforts to protect it in that loyalty and that spirit of human collaboration which alone can save civilization.

In telling the French they were protected from danger, the Premier referred to the morning's parade with the advice:

"Remember the display of our armored cars, of the speedy rolling forces with their cannons and machine-guns. Remember the sailors who represented among us the heroic crews of our squadrons which fought day and night over the ocean routes. Remember also the appearance of our intrepid air forces."

In the first display of air power, 100 French and 52 British planes appeared; they were followed by a fleet of 250 French aircraft.

Given Place of Honor

The 450 British soldiers in the parade along the Champs Elysees had a place of honor behind students of Military Schools and after them came the cream of the French Army.

There were troops of all colors and parts of the Empire—Moroccans, Spanish, Algerians, Tunisians, Senegalese, Zouaves and Indo-Chinese.

Parisian Firemen exhibited for the first time the city's new "rolling bomb shelters"—heavily armored trucks sealed against gas and with open rooms for the crew.

Premier Daladier traced the history of the French Revolution ascertaining that July 14, 1789, has become "the symbol of human freedom."

"French men and French women," he said, "you have been asked to make hard sacrifices. You have accepted them. For months, strengthened by your firm determination, we have substituted everything in the name of national preparedness."

"We have made a strenuous effort to obtain peace and liberty. We will pursue this goal without flinching, with that tenacity which inspired our great men of the past. But today you receive your first award. This Army you have made the safeguard of your liberties. You understand that it is capable of repelling any attack which threatens the safety of our country."

"Each of you recognized a son, a brother, a father, or a friend among the infantry who guard the hereditary traditions of heroism and endurance, the Alpine Troops with faces burned by icy winds, the sharpshooters of the mountains, the French Empire from the deserts and forests of Africa or Asia, the Legionnaires who are adopted children of our country, the heroes whose breasts are covered with medals, the engineers and cavalry proud of their arms and their skill."

Will Defend Liberties

"Against all threats, against all attempts at domination, we will be found resolved to defend French liberties and join our efforts to those of other nations, desirous of saving their integrity."

"Peaceful and strong, free and disciplined, France remains faithful to her magnificent history. This holiday affirming the unity of the nation proclaims a wider unity today—the indissoluble unity of our Empire."

"It is not Frenchmen alone who stand today before the altar of patriotism, but all men everywhere who live free and happy in dignity and honor, under the folds of the tri-color."

"The old French Federation has become a federation of peoples gathering under the same commonwealth and the same noble ideal, men of all races and all religions. France gives them security, prosperity, peace, and respect for their traditions and customs. They give France every day their devotion and solemnly rededicate their inviolable loyalty."

"Let me finally at this time of great national unity, send the greetings of France to all those friendly countries who share our ideals, to all those who are determined as we are to safeguard human dignity and freedom for their nations."

French concessions at Tientsin started June 14 when the Japanese demanded that the British hand over four alleged Chinese terrorists, but their demands later were broadened to include British "co-operation" in the Japanese establishment of a "new order in east Asia" and cessation of Britain's "pro-Chiang Kai-Shek attitude."

The blocked concessions passed an uneventful day amid outward indications of British efforts to avoid anything that might aggravate the situation.

Japanese interference with shipping on the Hai River at Tientsin continued but a majority of the cases involving foreign craft finally were settled through negotiations.

DEMONSTRATORS BLOCKED

TOKYO, July 14—A triple police cordon balked attempts of angry demonstrators against the British Embassy today as a noisy crowd of 50,000 men, women and children staged one of the fiercest parades in the history of a foreign country in Japan's history.

A march on the embassy climaxed nationwide demonstrations in which Japanese newspapers estimated 15,000,000 persons participated to show bitterness against Great Britain for her aid to Chiang Kai-Shek.

At the embassy the throng was held back by 1,000 policemen, who ringed the extensive embassy compound three deep with locked arms when they learned of the march.

Attempt to Force Gates

At the height of the two-hour demonstration the crowd parted and a three-wheeled motorcycle carrying four men dashed toward the gates, apparently in an attempt to force them, but the police stood fast. They also resisted attempts of other demonstrators to climb over them and mount the compound walls.

Several arrests were made in scuffling which followed such attempts. Sticks were thrown but no damage was reported.

The demonstrators, most of them members of patriotic societies, marched on the embassy after a meeting at Hibuya Park, where 1,000 heard orators demand that British cease aid to General Chiang Kai-Shek's Chinese Government and "withdraw from the far east."

"When the mob reached the embassy they were met by a line of the main business district and the Imperial Palace, some demonstrators tossed banners and placards and others shouting such slogans as "bomb Britain, enemy of justice and humanity!" and "no compromise in the Tokyo parity!"

Airliners Wing Way Over Atlantic On Test Flights

BOTWOOD, Nfld., July 14—Two airliners—one French and one from the United States—winged their way over the Atlantic tonight in unheralded experimental Transatlantic flights from America to Europe.

The Air France flying boat Lieutenant De Valseau Paris 6, which left Port Washington, N.Y. at dawn, was in the lead. Behind her by several hours sped the American Export Company's NC 1897 which had stopped here for re-fueling. The big French flying boat had made no stops since it left Port Washington and was sighted at Saint John, N. B., and Halifax on her way.

The American export ship landed at Botwood, base for Pan-American and Imperial Airways Transatlantic flights, at 1:05 p.m. ADT and took off two hours later.

The Lieutenant De Valseau Paris 6 was believed bound directly to France if weather conditions permitted. The American ship will land at Foynes, Eire.

Medical Officer Retires

LONDON, Ont., July 14—(CP)—Retirement of Lieut.-Col. G. C. Lawson, district medical officer for Military District No. 1, was announced today because of ill health. Col. Lawson, who joined the Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps at Halifax in 1910, has been absent on sick leave for some time.

He served at Halifax and Ottawa before the Great War and on the outbreak of hostilities took charge of hospitalization and invaliding at the office of the general medical service in Ottawa.

In 1917 Col. Lawson's services were loaned to the British Imperial Army as principal medical officer at the Chinese Coolie depot in Tientsin, China. From there he went to France as medical officer with troops and was on duty at the Chinese base hospital in France.

He served in army hospitals at Charlottetown, Saint John and Toronto before coming to London in 1927.

Gypsum Production Up 50 Per Cent

OTTAWA, July 14—(CP)—A jump of more than 50 per cent in gypsum production in the first four months of 1938 over the corresponding period of 1937 was reported today by the department of mines and resources. The current year's figure was 104,368 tons, compared with 68,138 tons.

Find Boy Chained To His Bed

MONTREAL, July 14—Police said tonight that they had taken to the juvenile detention home a 10-year-old boy found chained to his bed after neighbors notified them of the case.

The youth will be taken before Judge Robillard of juvenile court tomorrow and if the court orders a warrant, a charge will be laid against the father, it was stated at police headquarters.

Sergeant Gagnon and Constable Girard rescued the boy who had been left alone in the house all afternoon. The chain was loose enough to prevent him being injured but it kept him a prisoner in the house, police said.

Canadians Score 206 In Innings

CHELTENHAM, July 14—Scoring 206 runs in the first innings of a two-day match against a Cheltenham college eleven today, the touring Canadian college cricketers showed great improvement over their form in the opening matches this week. When stumps were drawn for the day Cheltenham had lost one wicket for 17 runs.
