**A TRAGIC SHOOTING.**—A tragic accident occurred at St. John's Nfld., last week, on the Freshwater road. Two boys Willie O'Dea and John Lamb, were playing, and one pointed an empty pipe-case at the other. The boys were alone in the house. O'Dea said: "Wait till I get father's gun." He took it down and pointed it at Lamb. Both boys intended to shoot. To the surprise of O'Dea the gun was loaded and the load of shot at short range tore Lamb's head to pieces. He lived only a few minutes after.

**SAD DROWNING ACCIDENT.**—The Summerside correspondent of the Guardian says: An inquest was held by Coroner Barclay, of O'Leary, last Wednesday evening, on the body of John Coughlan, of Brae, Lot 9, which was found in three feet of water at the mouth of Pierre Jacques River. Deceased had left his home in Brae, on Sunday, just before the gale began, intending to cross the river in a boat. The boat was found capsized with sail reefed at Pierre Jacques and the body about 300 yards distant. It is supposed that he had got on the boat after she had capsized and that he perished from exposure, as the body did not appear as if drowned. He was 28 years of age, and leaves a widow and three children.

**HIS LAST GOOD-BYE.**—The snow was drifted on the steps of C O Nelson's house, St Mark's avenue, Brooklyn, N Y, when he left home to go to work last Wednesday morning. His wife and four children kissed him at the door. "Good-bye!" they shouted as he started out, and he kissed his hand to them in the window. But as they looked the smiles on their faces changed to expressions of horror. On the second step from the top Nelson's foot slipped and he pitched forward into a big drift at the bottom. He lay face downward in the snow. His wife hurried to him and tried to raise him, but he fell back limp and insensible. She spoke to him, but he did not reply. As she stood by the prostrate body a policeman came along. At her request he called the ambulance from St Marc's hospital. The surgeon in charge of it looked at the man lying in the snow drift. "He's dead," was all he said. Nelson's neck had been broken. That first step toward his daily work had been his last in life.
