Accused's Counsel Enters Guilty Plea

In Magistrates Court yesterday afternoon, Bert Campbell acting as counsel for George Arthur Cudmore, Harrington, charged with not providing adequate food and water to cattle, entered a plea of guilty. The case was adjourned to Wednesday, March 2nd at 9:30 a.m. Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, presided.

A Clinton resident, Edison Walter Strickland, charged with theft of a battery from an automobile valued less than \$50, pleaded not guilty. His case was adjourned to Wednesday, March 9 at 9:30 a.m. Gordon Tweedy acted as counsel for the accused.

Philip Arnold Acorn of Lower Newton rendered a plea of not guilty for passing a school bus which was unloading school children before it had resumed movement. Frederick Elmer Quinn, Dun-

staffage, received a two year suspended sentence for arson. Charles MacQuaid, QC, represented the accused. James B. Firm To Produce Stainless Steel Tiles

William Rix, president of Charlottetown Metal Products, yesterday announced that his firm will soon be manufacturing stainless steel tiles for use in homes and institutions. Mr. Rix said his company will be the only manufacturer of this product in Canada and he pointed out there are only three firms in the United States that make a similar product. This move by Charlottetown Metal Products into the stainless steel field marks the first time the company has fabricated a product out of any material other than mild or carbon steel. Originally the company business was centered around the manufacture of culverts and steel guard rail for highways. Last fall they diversified into the manufacture of horsehoes. They are now the only horse shoe manufacturer in Canada today.

Dave Nicholson, secretary-treasurer of CMP, said the tiles could be used for home and institutional cooking areas, bathrooms, swimming pool liner, dairy and food plants, "any place where ease of cleaning and sanitation are the prime requisites."

The dyes for the manufacture of the new product were purchased from El Mech Manufacturing Co. of Welland, Ont. El Mech was a development company which was a wholly owned subsidiary of Atlas Steel Co. used by Atlas to find and develop new ways to use stainless steel. According to Mr. Rix Atlas told El Mech and a number of lines were sold off by the new owners as they didn't compliment the type of business which El Mech is now primarily interested in.

"The stainless steel tile line interested us," said Mr. Rix, "as it can be marketed through the hardware-building trade, people we are now dealing with marketing our horsehoes."

Mr. Rix said CMP expects to be able to market the new product by June and they will have warehouse facilities in Charlottetown, Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg and Vancouver."

He added that examples of the product will be seen in the Consumer Gas House display at the Canadian Home Show in Toronto between April 1-10.

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says by late Friday evening, a vigorous storm was affecting nearly all sections of the Maritimes. Snow, accompanied by strong winds, was falling in all three provinces. Along the south shore of Nova Scotia the snow had changed to rain. Up to 10 p.m. as much as six inches of snow had accumulated in many places with the promise of more to come except where the snow had turned to rain. Winds as high as 45 with gusts reaching 65 were reported through the evening along the Atlantic coast.

The centre of the storm was forecast to move through the Bay of Fundy overnight and across the Gulf of St. Lawrence today. This will draw somewhat milder air into Nova Scotia and most of Prince Edward Island for at least a short period with generally colder air remaining over New Brunswick.

Heavy snowfall warnings remain in effect for most regions and wind warnings have been issued for all regions. Snowfall amounts of six to 12 inches are predicted for New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, with amounts of five to 10 inches in Nova Scotia.

Regional forecasts: Northern Nova Scotia, Eastern Shore, Cape Breton, Prince Edward Island: Overcast with snowdrifts; a little colder; winds southerly 25, shifting in the afternoon to westerly 30 with gusts to 45; low-high at New

an inflammatory speech in the Commons he might find himself under such surveillance. Mr. Baldwin also said he can find no reason why the Commons committee on justice and legal rights should not call Spencer to testify.

Opposition Leader Diefenbaker spoke in the last 10 minutes of debate. "What's the government covering up?" he asked. "Where are the heads that are going to fall or swim?" he said, referring to a remark allegedly made by Spencer to a Vancouver reporter.

"Until this is answered, we have a responsibility." The decision not to hold an inquiry into the Spencer case was a perversion of elementary justice, Spencer had been pilloried. His name had been used in an unjustified way.

"Never before has a man been identified when the government doesn't act," Erik Nielsen (PC - Yukon) said the prime minister was wrong in saying Spencer identified himself as the man in the spy case, not the government.

Meeting Deals With Licences

BORDEN — A special council meeting to deal with the matter of issuing licences to contractors and organizations working within the town, was held in the Borden town hall Feb. 24. Present at the meeting were Mayor Gilbert Bell, and Councillors Reginald MacAeer, Arthur Jay, William Melvor and Fred Leard, town clerk.

A motion was passed that all incorporated companies, associations and co-partnerships whose principal office and organization was not within the province doing business in the town shall be assessed \$100 each. A company so assessed would submit lists of all employees from out of the province to the town clerk for assessment purposes. It was announced that if the lists were not forthcoming such a company would be liable for such an assessment. The assessment tax for each individual is 25.

It was moved and passed that \$2000 be set aside for savings in order to meet semi-annual sewage commitments.
