CUTTING CHRISTMAS TREES
For the information of persons cutting Christmas trees within the Province we quote Part 2 of "The Summary Tresspass Act", 1953, which reads as follows:
No person shall, except with the consent of the person legally entitled to the possession thereof,
(a) trespass on any land for the purpose of cutting down Christmas trees thereon; or
(b) cut down or attempt to cut down Christmas trees on any land.
Every person who violates any provision of this part shall be guilty of an offense and upon summary conviction shall be liable to a fine not exceeding fifty dollars.
In addition to such fine the magistrate imposing the same may order the guilty party to make restitution for the damage done.
