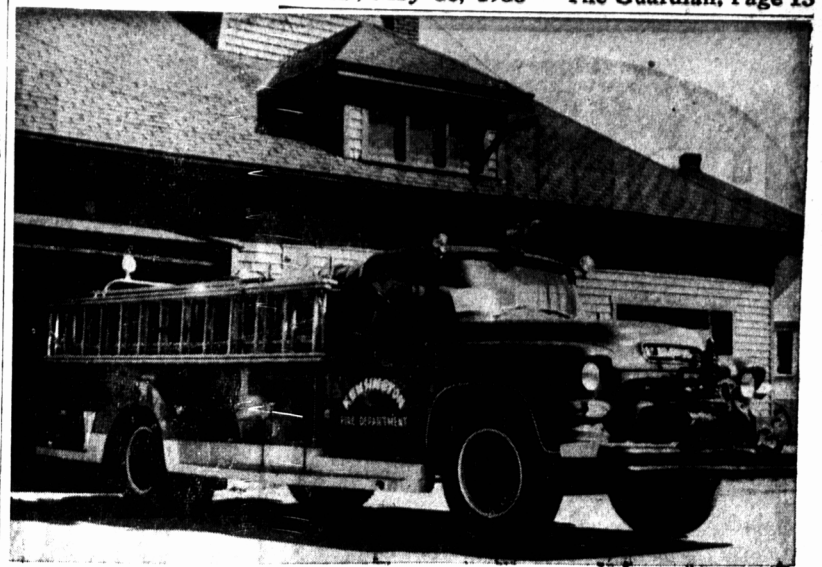
**Time Issue Discussed Last Night At Monthly Meeting Of The Summerside Town Council**

The resignation of Coun. J. L. MacDougall was received at the regular meeting of the Summerside Town Council, held last evening in the library and presided over by His Worship Mayor W. A. Currie, with all councillors present. The resignation, which was submitted with regret for reasons of health, became effective at the conclusion of last night's meeting although Coun. MacDougall stated during the meeting that if another meeting could be arranged for next week to give fair consideration to going on Daylight Saving Time in Summerside he would withhold his resignation until after that time. Four councillors, Clark, Lidstone, Jenkins and Cannon, supported him on this issue, but Mayor Currie, who also said he favored Daylight Time, stated that he felt nothing could be done this year and preferred not to have the matter brought up in council at present. He said nothing could be done with out flouting the law and the only way to get around it is through a change of store hours, which he added, is a matter for the retail merchants committee.

At the conclusion of the lengthy time discussion Mayor Currie asked Councillor Clark when the citizens of Summerside could expect street lighting. Coun. Clark said it is safe to say that in about two weeks time the area from Fitzroy Street south to Water St. including portions of both the West and East Wards as well as the Centre Ward could expect street lighting. In his report earlier in the meeting Coun. Clark said that street lighting work had not progressed as rapidly as was earlier anticipated due to several seasons, including temporary work done after the January storm which proved to be even more temporary than expected. He said some new type street lighting equipment will be used as well as some old type.

Coun. Clark, commenting on several power failures recently, said that one failure required looking into and in this case it was found the operator wasn't familiar with the type of situation that presented itself. He added that he hoped the operator had learned something from this experience. He said country districts were effected as well by the power failures and this matter was serious especially where chicken brooders used electricity for heating purposes.

**GOOD NEWS RE BONDS**  
Coun. MacDougall stated in his report that the town assessors were progressing favorably and should be finished on schedule. He said that favorable news has been received concerning the bond market, which has tightened somewhat, and it is expected that the Dominion Securities Ltd. syndicate will take up their 30-day option on the Summerside bond issue of \$475,000 before it expires.  
Coun. MacDougall commented on the \$21,098.67 already spent on repairing and renovating the old Post Office and said there are still



**NEW FIRE ENGINE FOR KENSINGTON**

Shown above is the new pumper fire engine purchased by the town of Kensington to provide its fire department with the very latest in fire fighting equipment. Custom made to suit the particular needs of this town, it features complete versatility of operation, and has a pumping capacity of 500 gallons of water per minute. It is also equipped with a portable auxiliary pump, with which it is possible to minute onto a blaze from any near-

by water supply. A CO2 fire extinguisher as well as a new type of water extinguisher, blinking siren and four spotlights, along with a 24-foot extension ladder and roof ladder, gives the fire department all the necessary tools to cope with any type of blaze likely to be encountered in a town of this size. Besides the equipment mentioned, it also carries 1,000 feet of one and one half inch hose, 400 feet of three-quarter inch hose, its own water tank carries 500 gallons of water, and there are outlets for five hoses of the three sizes mentioned above. Testing of this highly efficient modern pumper was carried out last night by an engineer from the Dominion Fire Underwriters with the Kensington Fire Department under the direction of Fire Chief Everett Champion prior to its acceptance by the town.
