IDA BAILEY ALLEN Caribbean Pickled Fish - Meatless Wonder Dish

LOOKING ahead to Lent, we suggest for tomorrow's dinner a Caribbean pickled fish dish. As this gains flavor when marinated up to 24 hours or more, it can be prepared now to serve tomorrow.

DINNER FOR ASH WEDNESDAY
Shrimp Bisque (Homemade or Frozen)
Caribbean Pickled Fish with Chick Peas
Buttered Green Beans (Fresh or Frozen)
Prune - Custard Float or Winter Pears and Cream Cheese
Coffee or Tea Milk

CARIBBEAN PICKLED FISH
2 lb. boned halibut, swordfish or haddock
1 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. ground black pepper
1-3 c. flour
1 c. olive or salad oil
1/4 c. cider vinegar
1/4 c. water
3 tsp. instant onion
3 tsp. minced green pepper
6 large bay leaves
1/4 tsp. whole allspice
1/4 tsp. whole black pepper
1/4 tsp. instant garlic
2-3 c. pitted small whole green olives
2 dried hot - red peppers, broken in half
4 c. shredded crisp chicory Pimiento - stuffed olives (extra) for garnish
Slice fish into serving pieces inches thick.
Now mix salt, black pepper and flour; rub half into the fish; roll fish in remainder.
Heat 1/4 c. of oil in large skillet. Add fish; saute on both sides about 10 min. Transfer fish to large bowl.
Combine remaining ingredients in saucepan, except chicory and pimiento - stuffed olives. Heat to boiling point; boil 1 min. Pour over fish; add remaining oil. Cover. Refrigerate.
Marinate all day or up to 24 h or more. Serve cold on platter covered with shredded crisp chicory. Garnish: pimiento-stuffed olives.

THE CHEF'S PRUNE CUSTARD FLOAT
Ingredients: 2 c. milk, 2 egg yolks (reserve whites), 1 tbsp. flour, 1/4 c. sugar, 1-1/2 tsp. salt, 1/4 tsp. vanilla, 1/4 tsp. ground nutmeg, Prune Whip (follows)
The Custard: Heat milk until bubbles form. Slightly beat egg yolks; stir in flour, sugar and salt. Stir into this 1/4 c. of heated milk; stir back into remaining hot milk. Cook - stir 3 min. at low heat until the mixture coats spoon; do not boil. Add vanilla and nutmeg. Cover; chill and portion into 6 deep sauce dishes.
