Canadian Holstein Is World Champion With Three Records

Selling Royal Wing, bred and owned by Albert Selling, Elmira, Ont., is the only Holstein in the world with three records above 1200 lbs. fat on official test, according to a bulletin issued by the Holstein Friesian Association of Canada, which is believed to be the only Holstein with more than one record exceeding 1200 lbs. fat on official test and regardless of times milked daily. Royal Wing made all three 1200 lb. records on three times a day milking in Canadian Record of Performance. As a seven year old she produced 1219 lbs. fat from 28,505 lbs. milk (4.28%), as a nine year old 1215 lbs. fat from 28,714 lbs. milk (4.23%) and as a ten year old 1214 lbs. fat from 30,540 lbs. milk (3.97%). In each of these three consecutive yearly records, her milk production increased. She has two other records made on twice a day milking which give her a lifetime total for five lactations of 123,283 lbs. milk containing 5072 lbs. fat, average test 4.1 per cent buterfat.

Conclusion Of Argument In Marketing Board Reference

A brief argument between attorneys regarding the quantity of potatoes consumed, or used, in this Province enlivened proceedings yesterday morning in the Supreme Court where a reference to the Potato Marketing Board was being heard by the full Bench of the Court.

Mr. R. H. Milliken, K.C., Regina, acting for the Board, the nominal plaintiff in the case, offered figures which indicated that the Province had consumed approximately 36.5 per cent of the potatoes produced here in the crop year of 1950-1951. Mr. K. M. Martin, K.C., appearing for the nominal defendant, H.B. Willis Inc., remarked that the figures were so absurd on their face that they must have a reasonable explanation.

Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell later remarked from the Bench that the Court would take judicial notice that primarily the potato crop is exportable. He thought the portion consumed in the Province is practically negligible and would not require marketing legislation.

The figures on potatoes were quoted from a statement compiled from a report of the Canadian Department of Agriculture, Ottawa. For the crop year 1950-1951 the total yield for this Province was given as 11,500,000 bushels with the local consumption being listed as 4,442,146 bushels or 38.6 per cent of the crop.

Local Consumption
It was mentioned that local consumption would probably include potatoes used in the homes of the producers, those sold to a local consuming public, amounts fed to livestock and what is sold to starch factories.
