Final contract — four spades doubled. Opening lead—five of diamonds. Sidney Lenz tells the story of the time many years ago when he played against a character whom he calls Mr. Grumpy and who fancied himself as a bridge player.

It was back in the days of Auction Bridge, and the bidding, which was radically different in those days, is therefore not given. Suffice it to say that the final contract was four spades played by Lenz (South) and doubled by Mr. Grumpy (East).

East took two diamond tricks and shifted to the queen of clubs. Lenz won with the ace and cashed the A-K of spades. Mr. Grumpy contributing the nine and jack.
