As For Natural Affection  
Man's Attitude Is Minus

DEAR MARY HAWORTH: A few months ago I lost a very good friend of long standing. She passed away after a lingering illness. Recently her husband has been calling me I have been a widow for more than a year. He is in every respect (save one, perhaps) a fine person. He was a good father and husband for many years. His wife told me near the end of her life that he had given her great happiness. She was a very loving person and I believe he reciprocated, which may cast light on the present difficulty. I am a Christian with high moral standards and I feel that his attitude towards sex and petting doesn't accord with my sense of propriety in our present status as friends and single persons. Dear R.G.: On the score of natural affection, the man's attitude towards you is definitely minus—it is cynically selfish, amoral and exploitative, an insult to your intelligence and honest aspiration to merit society's respect. He is proceeding slyly on the assumption that, given a time, he can make a conquest of you without involving himself in marriage. Such is the sole meaning and purpose of his sales pitch about entering into present enjoyment of the strong mutual sex attraction, with no limitations, no sense of sinning, etc. If he had the slightest notion of making you, sooner or later, he wouldn't be waging a campaign of this type, directly or indirectly. He would be getting down to cases, in terms of discussing respective obligations to blood kin (if any), the potential amalgamation of goods and chattels and otherwise assessing the feasibility of, versus the obstacles to, teaming-up with you as man and wife. Moreover, to the extent that he was wholeheartedly attracted to you, with dependable ardor, he also would be applauding you admirably if ruefully, for holding the line against disorderly sex gratification. So, to the question—Ought you to take a clean-cut stand and stick to it?—the answer is: Yes—should indeed. And do it now. If it puts him to flight and he stays away, at least you will be sparing yourself a continuing waste of time.
