# Ch'town YMCA Defeats Moncton

The Charlottetown YMCA swim team downed the Moncton 'Y' swim team 290 to 185 in the second event of the second annual Charlottetown 20, Moncton inter-city swim meet held Saturday at the Charlottetown 'Y' pool.

The first event of this year's competition was held at Moncton on January 4th. At that time the Moncton team edged the Charlottetown aggregation 257-259.

When the total points were added Charlottetown was the winner 517 - 284.

The meet, which pitted some 21 Moncton swimmers against 32 from Charlottetown, saw 19 native and five pool records broken. The breaking of so many pool marks such a short time after a Maritime meet is a rarity.
