EVANGELISTIC MOVEMENT.

The Methodist's Prepare For a Great Revival

The ministers and laymen of the Charlottetown District of the Methodist Church met in the First Church yesterday afternoon to discuss the Twentieth Century Evangelistic Movement.

The clergy present were Revs R. Ope, chairman of the district; W. H. Thomas, A. D. McCully, Wm. Wain, F. H. Rice, Joseph Perkins, Thomas Hicks, G. M. Young, J. W. McConeil.

In the evening a meeting was held in the school room of the church. A plan was outlined which gives to the movement the highest importance in the business of the year; provides for evangelistic conventions, on which occasions the questions of revival efforts in each and every circuit shall be considered; sets apart Oct. 14, 1900, known as the Twentieth Century Revival Sabbath, as the day on which revival sermons are to be preached to every congregation; and provides for an address, signed by the General Superintendent, setting apart the Friday preceding the Twentieth Century revival Sabbath as a day of solemn fasting and prayer, to be faithfully observed by all people, followed by public religious services in the evening, that in the spirit of confession, consecration and faith the entire church may enter upon this great movement.

Besides these provisions the plan states that on the last night of 1900 watchnight services will be held in every church, as far as possible, and that the morning service of the first Sabbath of 1901 will be a love-feast and sacramental occasion. The first Sabbath of February, 1901, is to be a Sunday School Day, the first Sabbath of March an Epworth League Day and the first Sabbath of April a Thanksgiving and Consecration Day, all uniting in a day of praise and gratitude before the Lord.

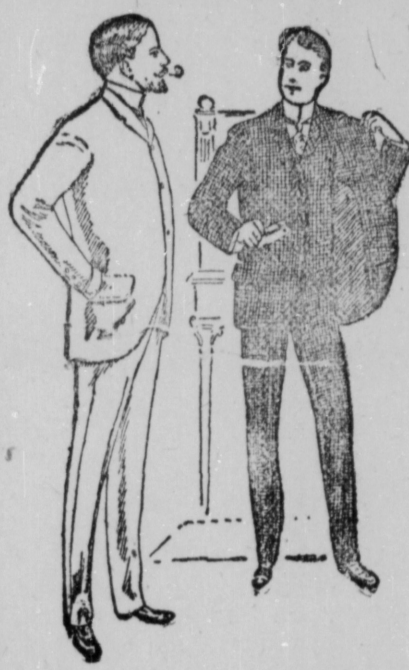
