MONTREAL (CP) Montreal Canadiens, with Jacques Plante back in goal, ended Detroit's 19-game undefeated streak Thursday night by whipping the Red Wings 4-1 in a National Hockey League game at Montreal.

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Bernie Faloney Works Out For First Time In 8 Weeks

HAMILTON (CP)—Quarter-back Bernie Faloney joined Hamilton Tiger-Cats in practice Thursday night for the first time in eight weeks. But the possibility of his being able to play in the Eastern Football Conference playoffs remains just as much a question as it was when he was sent home after the team's September game in Edmonton for an operation to remove a damaged cartilage from his knee.

Opinion of the team's medical staff is still based on the idea that the Ticats must go on the assumption that Faloney will not play again this year. Faloney himself just isn't sure. "This is really a sort of trial period," he said in referring to Thursday night's first workout. "I have to find out if I can run now. It will be the first time I have attempted to run since the September game in Edmonton."

"I'll have to take things easy and just feel my way around. I probably won't be actively participating in the practice, running plays and things like that, for the first little while. My leg is still weak. All I've done with it is walk and lift weights so far. I guess it's going to be largely a psychological thing—I'll have to tell myself I can run, run, run. The quarterback, selected as Canada's outstanding player last year, walks without noticeable limp now and outwardly appears to have recovered from the operation.

O'Brien Denies Riders Seek O'Quinn As GM

OTTAWA (CP)—J. Barry O'Brien, president of the Ottawa Rough Riders, Thursday denied a report that the Eastern Football Conference club is trying to hire former Montreal end John (Red) O'Quinn as its general manager. "We've talked to O'Quinn off and on in an effort to have him join our organization—perhaps in the promotional end—but he has not been offered the job as permanent general manager," O'Brien said.

Sports-editor Jack Koffman of the Citizen reported Thursday that O'Quinn, an outstanding end for Alouettes for eight seasons and now a Montreal resident, has been offered the job as general manager. Koffman said there are a few details to work out but that O'Quinn is interested in the job.

George Terlep, named Ottawa's first permanent general manager in 1959 and given a three-year contract in 1960, said he was not aware that the club was trying to hire O'Quinn and you'd think that if O'Quinn was to work in promotion that I'd know about it."

Terlep refused comment on Koffman's report of conflict between himself and Ottawa coach Frank Clark. In Montreal O'Quinn said the Ottawa club had been in contact with him "but there is nothing definite." "I am very interested, but haven't made any decision," he said. O'Quinn at present is assistant manager of sales for Canadian Pratt and Whitney Company.
