Guarantee Against Tieup Of Carferry In Event Of Strike Demanded By S'ide Trade Bd.

In an endeavor to prevent a tie-up of transportation at the Borden-Tormentine ferry terminals, in case of a new strike, the Council of the Summerside Board of Trade has drafted the following resolution to be sent to the Prime Minister.

Louis St. Laurent, to the Minister of Transport, to Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, M.P., Premier of Canada, and to the General Manager of the Canadian National Railway.

"It has been brought to the attention of the Summerside Board of Trade that the non-operating unions of the railways in Canada have started wage negotiations with their employers."

"It is pointed out by the Summerside Board of Trade, that it was the breakdown of negotiations between these same unions and the railways and the subsequent strike that caused the discontinuance of the ferry service between Port Borden, P.E.I. and Cape Tormentine, N.B., during the period from August 21st to August 30th, 1950."

"It is pointed out that this caused a considerable loss to the Province of Prince Edward Island through lack of transportation facilities for Island produce. It also caused the practically complete breakdown of this Province's tourist trade and created serious inconvenience to those attempting to travel to and from this Province as the only transportation, other than air, was the very limited ferry facilities of the Wood Island-Cariboo service."

"The Summerside Board of Trade wishes to point out that the Province of Prince Edward Island differs from most other Canadian Provinces in that it has only two means of transportation to and from the rest of Canada. They are by air or by sea. The main link

between this Province and the rest of Canada is by the ferry service operating between Port Borden and Cape Tormentine. By far the greatest proportion of goods and passengers coming to and leaving the Province use these facilities."

"The ferries used on this service are owned by the Dominion Government and turned over to the Canadian National Railway for operation purposes. These ferries are designed to carry automobiles, trucks, and busses and independent passengers as well as railway equipment."

"In view of the losses sustained by this Province during the last railway strike and the serious inconvenience to the travelling public, the Summerside Board of Trade urgently requests that arrangements be made now by the Dominion Government which will result in a guarantee being given this Island Province that the ferry service will continue to operate between Port Borden and Cape Tormentine, for the transportation of automobiles, trucks, busses and the passengers and goods carried by them in the event of a railway strike."

"The Board of Trade suggests that, if this guarantee cannot be obtained, the ferries be immediately taken over by the Department of Transport for operational purposes to ensure the obligation of the Dominion to provide continuous transportation to this Province as per the understanding at the time of this Province's confederation with the Dominion of Canada."

"The letter of the Board of Trade was given the approval of the Maritime Board of Trade at a meeting held on Monday at Moncton, N.B."

NEW YORK, July 18 — (AP) — The name of the new premier-designate of Iran, Ahmed Qavam, (pronounced Ah-med Kuh-vahm) may also be spelled in English as Ghavam, Kavam or Kawam, according to World Words, a Columbia University Press publication by W. Cabell Greet.

The last name also may be pronounced Ghu-vahm, Ka-vam and Kah-vahm. The publication gives Qavam as the preferred spelling.

Claims Ottawa Cracks Down On Russian Furs

VANCOUVER, July 18 — (CP) — An American fur broker said yesterday Ottawa had cracked down on importation of Russian furs into Canada.

He said Russian furs had been flooding the Canadian market.

Sol Rubin of Seattle, attending the Western Canada Raw Fur Auction here, said the Canadian Government acted "some weeks ago, according to an agent of mine in Montreal, who asked me to check all shipments for Russian furs as the Government was on the watch for them."

Nathan Sheinman of New York, also here for the sale, said: "The U. S. had an embargo against them, but some were still leaking across the border from Canada until the crackdown in this country. The Russian shipments consisted of muskrat, marten and sable. They were hitting the Canadian market, piecewise, because Canada is the exclusive supplier of furs for North America. Quality of Russian furs, however, like those of Alaska, was inferior to the north-west Canadian fur."

Some Bounce

QUEBEC, July 18 — (CP) — An elevator carrying 10 people fell six floors at the Quebec Government Buildings today, bounced up to the second floor and stopped there. None of the passengers were hurt.

The elevator dropped down the shaft of an annex of the main Parliament Building, the Agriculture Wing, bounced on safety springs at the bottom and shot up to the second. All passengers used the stairs to get to the ground floor.

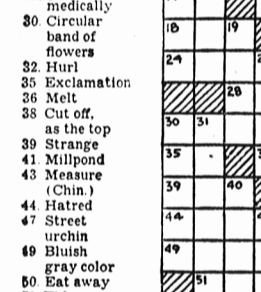
