Launch
Delayed

VANDEMBERG BASE, Calif. (CP) — Technical troubles forced postponement of the launching Saturday night of Canada's second satellite.

The launch was called off at 11:28 p.m. after two delays during the final countdown—one for 30 minutes because of a faulty hydraulic switch and the other because of trouble with the tracking radar.

The fault in the tracking radar could not be repaired immediately and the launch was called off.

The countdown, begun just before noon, had reached 68 seconds before launch when the radar trouble developed.

Officials rescheduled the launch for Sunday night. At noon Sunday, conditions looked good for a launch sometime between 8:48 p.m. and 11:30 p.m.

Saturday's final countdown started when weather information indicated a probable drop in the wind velocity in the jet-stream about 30,000 feet above the earth.

Funeral Service Today
For 5 Victims Of Fire

SUMMERSIDE The funeral for five members of one family who lost their lives in an early morning fire here Friday will be held at St. Paul's Catholic Church this morning at 9 a.m.

Trapped in the fire which gutted their home at 420 North Market Street in the west end of town were William Allen, 51, and four of his children, Joan Anne, 13, William Jr., 7, Nancy Fay, 5, and Kevin, 4.

Members of the George R. Peakes' Legion Home here, of which Mr. Allen was a member, will attend in a body and a Legion graveside service will be conducted.

Shortly after the tragedy became known here a committee, under the chairmanship of Charles Linkletter, was named and a trust fund was opened for surviving members of the family, Mrs. Allen and children, Richard, 18, Gay, 17, Sandra, 15, Patsy, 12 and Myra, 10 who escaped the Friday holocaust.

By Saturday morning the fund had grown to \$1,613 in cash along with articles of clothing and furniture.

It was learned from a member of the committee last night that most of the churches had collections for the fund at regular services yesterday but the exact amount collected could not be determined last night.

The committee spokesman stated that all types of material things have been received but that much more money is needed "to assist this family along their way of life for years to come."

HOME ARRANGED
A completely furnished house has been arranged for the family for the present, largely through the efforts of the local Legion Home.

Power Blackout
Hits Summerside

SUMMERSIDE — An employee of the town electric department, Robert Gallant, is in satisfactory condition in Prince County Hospital suffering from facial burns as a result of an accident at the town electric plant on Harvard Street yesterday morning which blacked out the entire town for some 10 minutes.

The accident occurred at approximately 9:30 a.m. when the electrician doing work on the switchgear, shorted out one of the main busbars. The plant superintendent, Tom Richardson, stated that the short caused a "big flash, a lot of smoke and some insulation was burned. He added "it also tripped a main breaker which ties us in with Maritime Electric."

With the power having been shut off at the plant while the work was going on, Mr. Richardson said the employees were not aware of the blackout until they began receiving calls from town residents. As soon as they received word, they restored the power by closing the breaker which had tripped.

SECOND BREAK
Another interruption in the northern section of town, consisting of Hillcrest and the Sherbrooke area, occurred shortly after lunch but power, on this occasion, was only off for approximately one minute.

Remains Sent
Home Today

SUMMERSIDE — The remains of a Glace Bay, N.S. girl, killed in a two-car collision at Clermont, a short distance from Kensington, Friday night, will be transferred to that Nova Scotia town today.

The girl, Ruby Munroe, whose home address is listed as 12½ Bruce Street, Glace Bay, was first reported to be 17 years of age but it was learned by the RCMP yesterday that she was only 16.

She was a passenger in a vehicle driven by Gary Thomas Dunphy of Margate at the time of the fatal crash. The second vehicle involved was driven by Ronald Patrick McGrath, Hunter River. Miss Munroe was thrown from the Dunphy vehicle and pinned under it.

Five Accidents
Probed By Police

SUMMERSIDE — A resident of Summerside, Carman Colwill, is a patient in Prince County Hospital believed to be suffering from serious leg injuries, a victim of one of the five motor vehicle accidents investigated by members of the Borden and Summerside RCMP Detachments and Town Police over the weekend.

The accident in which Mr. Colwill was involved occurred at Sunday morning on Lecky's Hill, some four miles east of here.

Mr. Colwill is reported to have been stopped and having difficulty with the engine of his re-earranged car. He was at the rear of the vehicle when he was struck by a car travelling in the same direction and jammed between the two vehicles. The driver of the second car who took Mr. Colwill to the hospital, has not been determined and investigation is continuing.

The extent of the victim's injuries could not be determined last night as the attending physician, Dr. S.R. Cameron, was not available.

At approximately 8:45 yesterday morning the Summerside Detachment was called to investigate a head-on collision at Wellington.

Involved were Francis Raymond Laughlin, Wellington, driving a 1957 model car and a 1961 model operated by Joseph Arsenault, also of Wellington.

DAMAGE ESTIMATE
Damage to the Laughlin vehicle was estimated at \$200 while the Arsenault vehicle sustained damage estimated at \$250. There were no injuries.
