

## Diplomat James Manion Dies Suddenly In Ottawa

It was a distinct shock to Canada to hear of the recent sudden death in Ottawa of Mr. James P. Manion who has served in the Canadian Embassy in Tokyo and Japan.

Mr. Manion, in his 52nd year was the eldest son of the late Hon. (Dr.) Robert J. Manion, former leader of the Conservative party. He had just completed a book dealing with his life in Ottawa and Fort William, in the diplomatic service, the Canadian Army, and the Department of Trade and Commerce, which will be published this fall.

Mr. Manion was dead upon arrival at the Ottawa General Hospital Tuesday June 2nd, after a fall on the basement stairs of his home, 540 Manor Road, Rockcliffe. Apparently Mr. Manion was coming upstairs when he tripped, fell and hit his head on the concrete floor in his basement.

He was born at Fort William and received his formal education at McGill with the degree of Bachelor of Commerce. He continued his studies at the London School of Economics and the Sor-

bonne in Paris. He was one of the last Canadians out of Paris after the German break-through in 1940. He participated in the Normandy landing and returned to Canada in 1945 with the rank of Lieutenant-colonel.

Mr. Manion was married in Paris in 1932 to Claire du Soule a member of a noted French family. She survives with four children Robert Manion, Montreal, Paul Manion, Fort Carborne, and the Misses Margaret and Diana, both at home.

### EARNEST W.I.

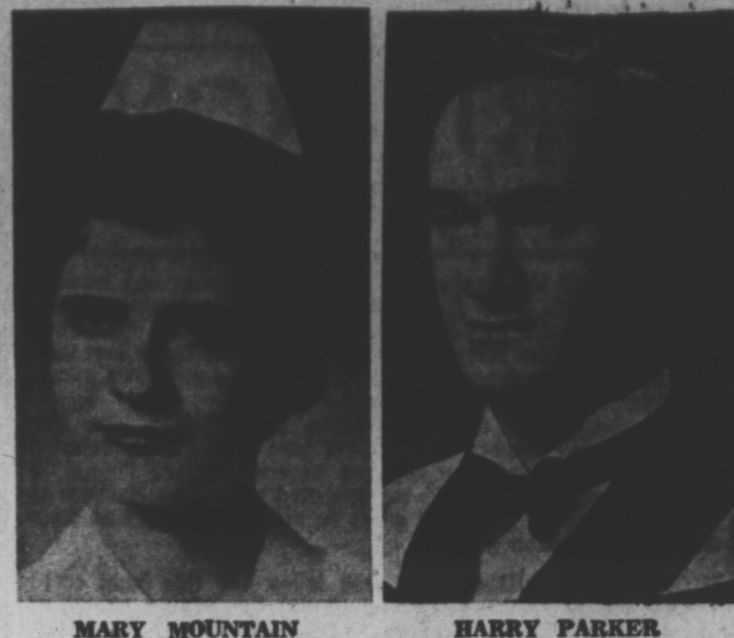

Mr. Murphy visited home last summer and left on October 1st for Vancouver in his "Suburban," via the southern states Mexico and California, arriving in Vancouver for Christmas. ### TODAY'S TREAT

#### SALMON AND PEAS SOUFFLE

1 cup hot milk  
3/4 cup soft bread crumbs  
1 tbs. butter  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1-4 teaspoon paprika  
1 1/2 cups flaked salmon  
1/2 cup peas  
2 eggs (whites only)  
Method — Cook bread crumbs, butter and seasonings in the hot milk for 3 minutes. Add salmon and peas, fold in whites of eggs which have been beaten stiff. Put in greased dish and bake about 25 minutes in moderate oven. This is a delicious never-fail Souffle.

#### LEMON PUDDING

1 tablespoon butter (softened)  
3/4 cup white sugar  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
Yolks of 2 eggs  
Method — Beat all ingredients together thoroughly. Add grated rind and juice of 1 lemon. Add 2 tablespoons flour (sifted). Beat 2 egg whites stiff, and fold into mixture. Add 1 cup milk. Bake in casserole in pan of hot water in moderate oven 350 degrees for 25 minutes. You have a light top and sauce underneath.
