SWALLOWED A COIN.—A death lately occurred under singular circumstances at Bristol, Ont. Four years ago Alice Francombe, a child 7 years of age, swallowed a halfpenny. At a later date she was subjected to the Roentgen rays, with the view of finding the whereabouts of the coin, but without success. No ill-effects appeared until recently, when the child was seized with violent sickness, and brought up the much corroded halfpenny. Internal hemorrhage resulted and she died.

BECAME TIRED OF LIFE.—Joseph E. Weston, of Sarnia, Ont., aged 26, a victim of locomotor ataxia, was foolish enough to think of marriage with Miss Etta Wright, of Windsor. His malady prevented his retaining any situation for any length of time. Convinced that his chances of success were very small, he called at the house of his fiancée in Windsor, and saying to Mrs. Wright and her daughter, "I have come here to have you witness this act," pulled a revolver from his overcoat pocket and fired two shots into his heart. The authorities did not think that an inquest was necessary.

LEFT LARGE ESTATES.—Within ten years 38 English bankers and merchants have left estates of an average value of £512,578, or over two and a half million dollars each. Coal and iron masters and engineers to the number of 110 left an average of £440,487 each. Ninety-three money-lenders left an aggregate of £19,444,878, and 193 manufacturers left an average estate each of £209,063. That makes a total of 344 business millionaires dead in Britain within ten years. If millionaire gentry and nobility were added, the number would possibly be increased by half.

EXTRAORDINARY LONGEVITY.—Chester, N. S., is a place of but a few hundred inhabitants, yet no less than fourteen of its men and women have come within a few years of the century mark. A list has lately been compiled showing their united ages to average over ninety years, viz., Mrs. B. Clinton, 94 years; Mrs. Joseph Corkum, 94 years; Mrs. Thomas Nass, 94 years; Mrs. Geo. Bond, 84 years; Messrs. Isaiah Bezanon, 91 years; Gaster Oxner, 94 years; James Daphinee, 83 years; Abraham Melvin, 87 years; Edward Shair, 88 years; Fred Morash, 87 years; John O'Connors, 94 years; John F. Ratuse, 86 years; Lyndal, 98 years; William Evans, 87 years. Grand total of ages, 1,261 years. Thus the average age of each of the fourteen persons is 90 years and 26 days. Mr. William Evans is a son of one of the heroes of Trafalgar. He manages two farms, and is yet capable of doing a good day's work, it is said.

RICHMOND WAS IN DARKNESS.

Melting Snow Causes a Flood in the James River Valley.

RICHMOND, Va., Feb. 21.—Richmond was in darkness last night because of an unprecedented flood on the James river. At least one-half of the two feet of snow that covered the James River melted yesterday, and the reports from upper river points tell of a marvellously rapid rise of all the stream's tributary.

The flood is already over the wharves here, and far up into the city. At 9 o'clock last evening all electric cars were stopped by the flooding of the power plants. Then the lights went out. The warehouses of the steamers lines are packed with freight, and the loss will be very heavy.

Ice is packed against Mayo's bridge, which connects Richmond with Manchester, higher than that structure, and one span has been swept away on the Manchester side of the river. In one place ice gorges form and break, causing sudden rises on the water front.

The shipping in the river is drawn up behind the breakwater at the entrance to the canal, and is safe from the ice.

A CENTENARIAN.—Glace Bay has probably the oldest person living in Cape Breton or Nova Scotia in the person of Mr. Michael McNeill Ban. His age is 103 years. He resides with his son, Mr. James McNeill, who is 74 years of age.
