OTTAWA (CP)—The accident in which Fisheries Minister Sinclair was seriously injured during his Russian visit last summer was "entirely my own fault," he said Thursday.

He told a press conference he was trying to take a picture of the harbor at Petropavlovsk last Aug. 4 when a catwalk collapsed under him and seven companions.

Five of the others on the catwalk were injured. One Russian suffered a fractured skull. All six were in the same ward at the little hospital in the Siberian fishing village.

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U.S. Sounds Warning On Folly Of Middle East War

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States and Britain were moving with one-two diplomacy Thursday to coax Israel and Egypt away from hostilities and into negotiations to settle their long dispute.

The state department, taking President Eisenhower's Middle East policy declaration Wednesday as its text, laid down this rule: "We would be strongly opposed to the side which starts a war and would be very favorably disposed to the side which convinces us that it desires to maintain peace."

The department warned that war would be "utter folly." The spokesman who issued this statement, Lincoln White, compared a British mediation offer made Wednesday night by Prime Minister Eden to peace proposals put forward Aug. 26 by State Secretary Dulles. He said there was a "close parallel."

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Files Purlioned From Famed Scotland Yards

LONDON (Reuters) — Scotland Yard chiefs are engaged in one of the most serious investigations in British criminal history—into the organization of Scotland Yard itself.

The British police headquarters has been shaken to its foundations by the discovery that top-secret criminal records—worth a fortune to blackmailers—have passed into outside hands.

Six or seven confidential files relating to the conviction of women were found Tuesday in a woman's apartment in a London suburb.

Police raided the apartment after being told by a woman informant that she had seen papers in the apartment relating to prison offences and sentences.

SEERGEANT SUSPENDED A 43-year-old police sergeant, with 20 years experience in the Scotland Yard records office, was suspended from duty during the investigation.

Scotland Yard's best detectives were assigned to the case by Commissioner Sir John Nott-Bower. Their secret investigation of fel-

low officers may lead to one of the biggest administrative shake-ups in British police history.

The files which had been removed were "booked out" last weekend by the records office and are undergoing laboratory tests to see whether they have been altered or interfered with.

SECRET INFORMATION The yard's biggest concern is whether other files have been removed in the past and whether any are still missing.

The files cover about 1,500,000 men and women and record all manner of offences, plus the photographs and fingerprints of known criminals.

They also include secret information given to Scotland Yard by the police of all countries which have links with the international criminal police commission.

Newspapers describe the affair today as a "Yard scandal." One declares that the discovery of the purloined files is "the biggest crisis the Yard has faced in 20 years."

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
