## Learned A Lot In United States Says London

PRESTWICK, Scotland (AP)—Brian London returned to Britain Thursday and said that three weeks in the boxing world of the United States had been more valuable than six years at home. The 24-year-old Briton was knocked out in the 11th round by world heavyweight champion Patterson in their title fight in Indianapolis last Friday.

"But I learned a lot over there," London said. "I've found a good friend in former world champion Jack Dempsey. Jack thinks I will get to the top. He told me I have got the basis — strength, stamina and the ability to take a punch. "He taught me a good deal about weaving and punching and has promised to help me again. I would like to bring this American style of fighting over here."

London said he probably will return to the United States in three months' time. "I have been offered three or four fights in America."

MONTAGUE —Louis Castello, president of the Southern Kings Fish and Game Association announced last night at the regular meeting, held in Cardigan Parish Hall that \$500.00 would be forthcoming from the provincial government for assistance in stream improvement.

It was decided at a previous meeting that some improvement to a number of streams in the area was necessary and plans were in the making to begin with the Lewis dam at Cardigan. At last night's meeting it was moved and seconded to go ahead with this dam with a bypass for the overflow and a pipe to flow

the water to pass from the bottom of the dam thus preventing stagnant water above the dam. This work will be started almost immediately.

It is the intention of the Association to do as many of these streams as possible in the next year.

During the regular business it was decided to go along with the eastern branch of the County on their resolution requesting a bounty of \$3.00 on foxes and 'chipmunks' the year round.

The meeting was well attended and some lively discussions took place on the sawdust problem, private ponds and methods of stream improvement.

The only run off the veteran righthander was unearned. The Detroit infield pulled Lary out of three mild jams in the first four innings with double plays. The first Boston batter up in the ninth Frank Malzone, singled but was wiped out on Detroit's fourth double play of the afternoon.

Lary bested Ike Delock in a solid pitchers duel decided on a pair of runs in the sixth inning. Delock helped the Tigers to the decisive rally by failing to field a sacrifice bunt that loaded the bases with no one out. One run scored when Al Kaline hit one in front of right fielder Jackie Jensen.
