

Mazzinghi Wins Boxing Ch'ship

MILAN, Italy — Hard-hitting Sandro Mazzinghi of Italy won the world junior middleweight boxing championship Saturday night with a surprising ninth-round knockout victory over titleholder Ralph Dupas of the U.S.

The 25-year-old Mazzinghi, who has been boxing professionally for only two years, struck Dupas early in the round with straight left and right hooks.

The champion tried blocking tactics but Mazzinghi dropped him with a right to the head. Dupas got off his knees at the count of seven and was staggering to the ropes, dazed and groggy, when the referee completed the count.

After the fight, which had been scheduled for 15 rounds, Dupas protested the Swiss referee's knockout verdict and claimed he was ready to continue the fight.

The New Orleans battler admitted Mazzinghi was a tough

boxer and the most formidable he had ever met.

Angelo Dundee, Dupas's manager, said he would ask for a return fight with Mazzinghi at Sydney, Australia, where he already had offers from promoter Harry Miller.

The new champion, who comes from Florence, has won 28 of his 29 professional fights, and had a draw in the other. He weighed 133 pounds to Dupas' 132½.

Red Wings Open Training Camp; Howe Is Back Again

DETROIT (AP)—His hair is peppered gray and there's a little less of it. Otherwise Gordie Howe isn't changed much from the hassled, 16-year-old kid who attended his first National Hockey League training camp before the end of the six-time NHL, most valuable player and six-time scoring champion.

"I had a pretty good season last year, and my teammates aren't bothering me just because I'm a bit tired after the first day but I feel the same way when I was 16."

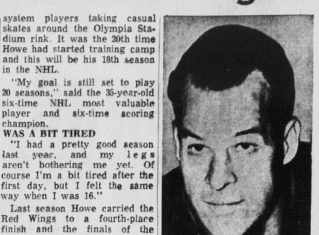
Last season Howe carried the Red Wings to a fourth-place finish and the finals of the Stanley Cup playoffs. He was the scoring champion and won a record sixth Hart Trophy that goes to the NHL's most valuable player.

Now the mark he wants most is just five goals away. He finished last season with 549 goals in his career. Howe's greatest rival as a player in the post-war period, Maurice (Rocket) Richard of the Montreal Canadiens, retired a few years ago with 564 goals.

Manager-coach Sid Abel said he is considering inserting a little bit with Howe's line. Last year Howe played right wing with Alex Devecchio in the center and Parker Macdonald at left wing.

"I figure we're going to be stronger at centre ice with the players we drafted," Abel said. "The first thing I may do is to switch Devecchio to left wing. He's played it before, and he WILL WAIT AND SEE."

"Of course, people say 'it's not good' because they say it's a good combination. But I may if I see a player I like at training camp goes along. That's the reason for having training camp anyway, finding things out."

Abel's new centres are Hank Coles, Art Stratton and Ted Hampson, all with some experience with other NHL clubs.

Observer Abel doesn't expect to make many changes with his team that was the biggest surprise in the league last season.

He hopes to find another defenceman, having finally become fed up with Howie Young's badboy antics on and off the ice. Young was traded to Chicago for goalie Roger Crozier and defenceman Ross Ingram.

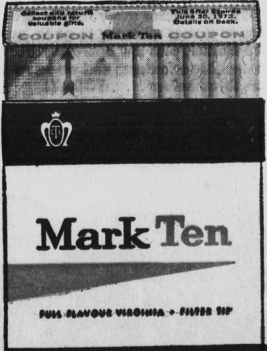
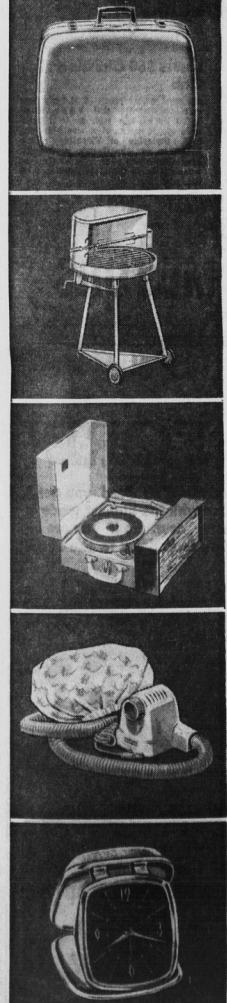
Ingram is the likely candidate to start to replace Young and be the fifth defenceman. And Crozier has a chance to stick with the club as helper to goalie Terry Sawchuk, who had one of his better seasons.

Abel again plans to keep two goalies with the Red Wings.

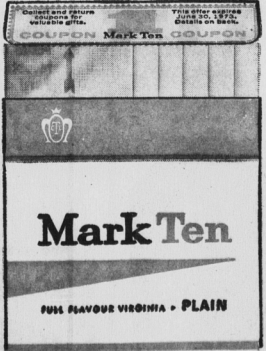
Dennis Riggs, who held the second goalie job at the start of last season, did not report, and Abel expects him to retire.

Cardinals Gain Game In Dodgers

NEW YORK (AP)—Helped by a show of power from San Francisco Giants, the striking St. Louis Cardinals gained on the National League-leading Los Angeles Dodgers Saturday.

The Cards defeated Pittsburgh Pirates 6-3 when Curt Flood struck home the winning run in the ninth inning. And at San Francisco, home runs by Willie Mays, Orlando Cepeda and Willie McCovey carried the Giants to a 5-3 victory over the Dodgers, leaving the Dodgers only 4½ games ahead of the Cardinals.

Roger Maris drove in four runs with a home and a single as New York Yankee crumpled for eight runs in the fifth inning and an 11-4 rout of Detroit Tigers.

By winning, the Yankee held their American League lead of 2½ games over Minnesota Twins, who beat Chicago White Sox 4-2 on Rich Robins two-run single in the 12th inning.

In National League night games, Howe's two-run double with two out in the last of the ninth inning gave Houston Astros a 3-2 lead over the Yankees. Right-hander Juan Marchal won ton Colts and Dick Farrell a 3-2 squeaker over Chicago Cubs.

The Tigers had a big inning against the Yankees, scoring five times in the fourth, but were sent to defeat by the Yankees' ace, Tom Seaver, in the fifth. Maris started the scoring in the fifth with his homer, following a single by Moe Drabowski, and closed it with his two-run single.
