Quebec Minister Backs Move To Handle Slower Students

QUEBEC (CP)—Arthur Tremblay, Quebec's deputy minister of education, has expressed special support for the "Parental commission's" recommendation of a child of 13 years or over be kept in primary school.

He said the commission, which issued reports last year on the reform of Quebec education, had solved the problem of backward children who fall behind as others go on into secondary classes.

The solution had come in the form of the division of the initial secondary school grade — the seventh-into two sections, one regular and the other especially designed for the backward pupils, said Mr. Tremblay.

He was addressing the opening session of a two-day colloquium attended by 1,600 educationists. They will discuss the government's plans for increasing regional school boards and the commission's recommendations on secondary education.

Mr. Tremblay said the education department will take action on the extension of school facilities in the light of advance from persons directly involved in education.

The colloquium is designed to give officials concerned in the school-board program — called operation 55 — a chance to discuss the problems involved.

Education Minister Paul Gelin-Lajoie told the colloquium that the first objective of operation 55 has been completed.

Pope Paul Sounds Note Of Warning

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Pope Paul VI has cautioned against "rational expedients" that would minimize Roman Catholic dogma for the sake of Christian unity.

He said at this weekly general audience before several thousand persons Wednesday that a temptation to seek expedients "sometimes works it way easily into good souls."

The intention is good, "the method not," he said.

The pontiff sounded his note of caution in current Christian unity efforts one day after the World Council of Churches announced at a meeting at Enghien, Belgium, it would create a working committee for consultation with the Vatican. The council is made up of 214 Protestant Anglican, Orthodox and other non-Catholic Christian Churches.

Sources here said the Vatican already has given a green light for Roman Catholic ecumenism (unity) experts to serve on the new World Council committee. The world council said it would be composed of eight World Council representatives and six Vatican delegates.
