Rotarians Hear How Money Is Spent For Crippled Children

In a breakdown of the expenditure on behalf of crippled and handicapped children by the Red Cross, Dr. Harold Shaw told Rotarians at their weekly luncheon at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday that 155 cases were dealt with at an average cost of \$40.00. Of this amount the Rotary Club, as a result of the auction was able to contribute \$26.00 in each case. The Junior Red Cross contributed \$9.50, the Masonic Auction at Montague \$3.60 and the parents .80 cents. 35 of the children were hospital surgical cases, 17 of them being operated on outside the Province and 19 locally. 725 days hospitalization cost approximately \$6.20 per day.

President George Fisher who was in charge of the meeting asked the members to "Pause, review and look to the future" as the directors and their committee heads submitted reports.

Dan Reid, 76 Died In Port Arthur

One of Port Arthur's best known and respected transit conductors, Dan Reid of 125 Prospect Ave., died Jan. 12, following an illness of 10 days in hospital. He was 76.

When Mr. Reid retired in 1949 after 45 years' service with the department of transit, he was the oldest employee from the standpoint of service and at the time was traffic manager. He went to work for the street railway May 1, 1904, 12 years after Port Arthur purchased its first street car FROM CHARLOTTETOWN.

He came to Port Arthur with his mother and sisters when he was 16. He was born at Charlottetown, P.E.I., and moved to Boston, Mass., with his parents 10 years later. Shortly after the death of his father, his mother decided to make Port Arthur the family home.

Young Dan did various odd jobs about Port Arthur before working for the street railway. He worked for a time as a volunteer fireman, getting 50 cents for the first hour of a fire.

When Mr. Reid first took employment with the street railway, he alternated as a motorman and conductor. The three-car system had four operators, including Dan, who worked 10, 12 and 14 hours, depending on traffic. One of Mr. Reid's first fellow workers was George Gibbon, who eventually went into the grocery business and became mayor of the city.

TRAFFIC CHIEF
Mr. Reid became chief supervisor of traffic in 1916 and had been on the same job until his retirement. When he was appointed he worked 16 to 18 hours seven days a week for \$90 a month. He was never off the job a day, except for a month when he suffered a knee injury.

Surviving are his wife, Priscilla; two sons, Walter, 300 Roberts St., also with the transit department and Daniel of Edmonton, Alta.; one daughter, Priscilla, Mrs. N. Knutson, 125 Prospect Ave., four grandchildren.
