## League Balance

**DURING THE PAST six seasons five different clubs—Milwaukee, Los Angeles, Pittsburgh, Cincinnati, San Francisco and Los Angeles again—have won the National League championship. The way the standings are set, a sixth team, Philadelphia, could walk off with honors in '64.**

The American League is not so fortunate. New York Yankee has won the league title eight times in nine years, a remarkable demonstration of imbalance. The year the Yankees made it was Chicago White Sox captured the AL trophy.

The Yanks are off to a slow start this season (only into last night's games they were in fifth place, playing 300 ball), but a winning streak of five games would probably move them into top spot. If the Yanks start winning games, first place Cleveland Indians would probably be a scared they'd start losing and drop to the 200 mark themselves.

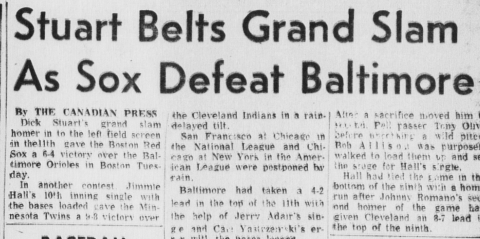
