Nova Scotia's Mineral Products.

(St. John Sun)

Nova Scotia is sufficiently rich in minerals to have a department in the government especially charged with the supervision of which has recently appeared. The revenue derived therefrom approximates somewhat to our own receipts from crown lands and stumpage, from which sources the sister province receives but a small sum. For the past year the receipts of the department of mines was \$119,229, of which \$104,000 was on account of coal royalties and mining licenses.

Coal is in the aggregate not only the largest in quantity but the most valuable of the mineral products of the province. There are three clusters of collieries respectively, 9 in Cumberland County, 5 in Pictou County, and 13 in Cape Breton County. These produced during the year 1-352 203 tons, of which the Spring Hill mines yielded one-fourth part. Some comparison of the sales last year and the previous year will be found of interest:—

The figures mark a decrease in the sales in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, the States and West Indies, and an increase in P. E. Island and Quebec.

Next to coal, gold is the most productive mineral in the province, the yield being set down at 22,203 ounces, valued at about \$444,000. This is said to be the largest yield since Confederation. In 1867 the product was 27,000 ounces, but it fell off year by year till twelve years ago only 9,000 to 10,000 ounces were mined, since which time it has again increased to the figures given above.

A Smart Woman

A writer in the *Woman's Journal* tells of Mrs. Mary Pollard, now 83 years old, who lives in Skowhegan, Me., on a farm of 200 acres. She superintends the work, hires all her men, and through her good management the farm pays the help besides giving her a comfortable income. Last summer, besides doing her housework, she made butter and cheese to sell, and picked and canned more berries than any one in the neighborhood. Every batch of blackberries that she picked involved a three miles' walk. Through haying she milked four cows every night, and took the entire care of the pigs, hens and chickens. She has woven three rag carpets for her friends, besides cutting the rags and weaving another one for herself. She lives five miles from the village, where she attends church regularly. During an exhibition of the high school she was present both evenings until 11 o'clock, returning home each night. She reads her daily paper, is well posted on all the leading topics of the day, and is blessed with a wonderful memory, so that her neighbors refer to her for dates in the past. She is interested in all new and progressive questions, eager as a child to learn and a sage to give counsel. Little children love to visit her, young people enjoy her companionship and everybody loves her.

The Fisheries Question.

The Washington correspondent of the *Toronto Globe* says:—

"The prevalent belief here is that Congress will pass a bill authorizing the President to regulate upon Canada by placing an embargo on her fishing vessels in the United States ports within ten days. In the ordinary course of legislation upon an ordinary subject this would be simply impossible as business is generally conducted. There is so much red tape necessary to pass a Bill through the House that the Bill introduced by Senator Frye and Representative Dingley in the Senate and House respectively on Monday would stand no chance of enactment under ordinary circumstances. In this instance, however, extraordinary means are to be adopted. Some time ago the House passed a Bill designed to change the navigation laws for the benefit of American ship-owners. This Bill is now on the calendar of the Senate, and may be taken up at any time. The Senate Committee on Commerce will to-morrow take up the Frye Bill, and the programme now is to do it as an amendment to the House Navigation Bill now on the calendar. There is little doubt as to the course of the Senate. The amendment will be adopted and sent back to the House for its concurrence. It is the belief of those who have paid any attention to the matter that the Bill will be a law within ten days, and that the President will consider that the exigency exists for issuing a proclamation closing American ports to Canadian fishing vessels in search of supplies in the markets of the United States."

A resident of Minnesota, who has seen several severe tornadoes, says that their most peculiar feature is the singular sucking movement. Buildings are sucked up into the clouds entire, and come down soon in fragments. After the great Rochester tornado a farmer twelve miles from the town found a unimpaired marble top table in his field. Another found a very large sheep that had come from no one knew where, and had been deposited in his yard unharmed. The Minnesota man further said that he had seen a board into which wheat straw had been driven until they stuck through on the other side. Also he saw a plank driven through a big tree, and a piece of pins moulding driven through a small butternut tree.

A Murderer's Death.

Several days ago, on a reach thirty miles south of Big Springs, Texas, Juan Salles, a Mexican herder, brutally murdered a comrade named Mock, from Youngstown, Ohio. Salles fled and it was thought he had succeeded in reaching Mexico, but information received at Big Springs states that after committing the deed he fled toward the northwest and was followed several hours after by Mock's cowboy friends. Near Yellow Horse Canyon, as the murderer Salles surrounded it, when Salles, seeing his escape impossible, set fire to the store and perished in the flames.

Loss of Life at Sea.

A return has been issued by the Marine Department of the British Board of Trade as a Parliamentary paper showing the number of lives lost in steamers belonging to the United Kingdom by casualties at sea during the years 1883-4 and 1884-5. A summary of results shows that the total number of lives lost in steamers during the year 1884-5 was 707 as compared 614 in the year before. These 707 lives are accounted for thus—by foundering, 121 seamen and one passenger; by missing vessels, 338 seamen and 10 passenger; by strandings, 46 seamen and four passengers; by collisions, 74 seamen and 23 passengers; and from other causes, 37 seamen and three passengers. The number of missing steamers in 1883-4 was 11, and in 1884-5 it was 16.
