U.K. Gov't Promises To Take Dispute To U.N.

LONDON (CP) — History was made Thursday night in a mere five minutes. In that short time, the British government pledged it will take the Suez Canal dispute to the United Nations—Egypt refuses to "co-operate."

He said: "We are in complete agreement with the United States government on what to do. We propose to ask for Egyptian co-operation. If they are in default we will take them to the security council."

Several Commonwealth countries, including India and Australia expressed reservations about the implications of British policy, and it was believed that Canada largely shared these misgivings. Canada has always supported a United Nations solution.

Eden Is Given Confidence Vote On Suez Canal Issue

LONDON (CP) — Prime Minister Eden's government Thursday night won a vote of confidence in its Suez policy after the prime minister had promised that, barring emergency, the United Nations would be consulted before force was employed against Egypt.

Such a pledge or guarantee is to be absolute, then neither I nor any British minister could give it. No one can possibly tell what will be (Egyptian president) Col. Nasser's action either in the canal or in Egypt.

Turning toward former prime minister Sir Winston Churchill who sat near him, Eden said: "My right honorable friend tells me he agreed with me then—and he tells me he agrees with me now."

ISRAEL NEXT — Eden predicted that Nasser's next step undoubtedly would be an attack on Israel if he were successful in his Suez action.

U.S. Goes Ahead With Suez Plans

WASHINGTON (AP) — State Secretary Dulles said Thursday the United States will push ahead with plans for a Suez Canal shipping association despite Egypt's assertion that implementation of the plan "means war."

Other countries using the canal have been asked to join the enterprise. ASKS RECONSIDERATION — Dulles is understood to have offered it as a stop-gap promise until diplomacy settles the dispute with Egypt over who is to operate the strategic waterway.

FIRM STAND

Dulles spoke out firmly at a press conference a few minutes after receiving a message from the Egyptian government bitterly assailing the new plan, which is sponsored by the Western Big Three.

He refused to spell out precisely what he meant by "other action," saying it depended on the circumstances at the time. Hopes To Introduce Canadian Fishing Techniques In Russia

VANCOUVER (CP) — Russian Fisheries Minister Alexander Iakov, on the final day of his nine-day visit to British Columbia, told newspaper men Thursday he has seen techniques here which he hopes to introduce to the Russian industry.

He said he hopes to see that Russia may be able to import fish and fishing vessels from Canada as well as some fish plant equipment and that there will be a continuing exchange of technical knowledge.

United Church Reports Great Building Construction Need

WINDSOR, Ont. (CP) — The treasurer of the United Church of Canada said Thursday a new church is needed every two days if the United Church is to keep pace with Canada's growth.

Dr. Victor T. Mooney told the church's general council holding its 17th biennial conference here, that the United Church "must not fail in doing its share to keep Canada Christian."

Nehru Warns Of War Danger

NEW DELHI (Reuters) — Prime Minister Nehru Thursday warned that his plan for a Suez Canal users' association involves "grave risk of conflict" with Egypt and urged her to drop it.

CONTROL PLAN REJECTED — Nehru said Egyptian President Nasser has "opened the way to negotiations" by refusing the international control plan brought to Cairo by a five-nation mission headed by Australian Prime Minister Menzies.

RAUGHT WITH DANGER — Nehru said that any attempt to enforce a settlement by threats or force would "disregard the rights of nations—even as the failure to observe international treaties and obligations would be."
