

# Johnny Kalmuck, Headway Win Features

## Bay State Pat Lowers Mark; Wins 2.25 Pace

Johnny Kalmuck, owned and driven by Walter Kelly of Southport and Headway owned by James Given of Halifax and reined by Harley Harrison won the Free For All at the Charlottetown Driving Park last night as the Old Home Week racing programme got underway.

Andrew Perry's Bay State Pat lowered her mark by one and four-fifths seconds as she won the opening heat of the Classified Pace. She paced the mile in 2:15 2-5. After finishing fifth in the second heat she returned to win the third heat and the race.

Babe Britton won the opening heat of the Free For All Pace and Jerry's Nightmare also won the opening heat of the second Free For All.

Bay State Pat's performance was probably the highlight of the opening night's meet. She paced the last half of the first mile in 1:05 2-5.

Jerry's Nightmare won the opening heat of the Free For All in 2:10 3-5 for the fastest mile of the meet.

A cool, damp breeze appeared to slow the horses during the latter part of the evening with the result that Johnny Kalmuck won the final heat of the Free For All Pace in 2:15 and Headway edged Jerry's Nightmare in 2:14.

The quarter on Keppoch Playgirl and Brady's Battle in the fourth race paid \$493.60. The daily double on Babe Britton and Jerry's Nightmare paid \$7.50.

Jerry's Nightmare won the first dash of the Free For All after beating off a determined challenge by Future Counsel and Headway. The three horses raced down the stretch with Jerry's Nightmare winning by half a length.

Headway, who broke going away, came up from far back while Future Counsel went most of the mile in third position.

Headway, reined by Harley Harrison, was not to be denied in the second heat. The big brown son of Scotland paced about five eighths of the mile on the outside and came under the wire a length in front of Whispering Hope.

Jerry's Nightmare went away on top and held the lead until the 5/8ths pole when Headway moved to front. Whispering Hope passed Jerry's Nightmare on the upper turn and finished second.

Headway and Jerry's Nightmare battled to the wire in the third and final heat on the card. Hedgewood Chief driven by Eugene Harrison went away on top. Headway came up from fourth place to lead at the half and was never headed.

Whispering Hope, driven by Cyril Smith, made a move on the back stretch and pulled into second position. Jerry's Nightmare came on again at the upper turn but lost out in a photo finish.

In the first heat of the Free For All Pace Babe Britton and Seven Up Direct waged a stirring battle in the stretch with Babe Britton coming up on the outside to win by half a length.

Seven Up Direct went away on top followed by Babe Britton on the outside and Honest Abe. The Babe, unable to get tuckers in, paced the mile on the outside and finished third.

Walter Kelly took Johnny Kalmuck out at the half in the third heat and raced Babe Britton down the stretch to win by half a length.

Honest Abe went away on top and led to the half when both Johnny and the Babe passed him. Babe Britton challenged Johnny at the top of the stretch but could not overtake the Kelly reined horse.

Bay State Pat was an easy winner in the opening dash of the 2:25 Pace. Owned by Andrew Perry of Summerside and driven by James MacGregor she went into the lead at the first turn only to see Captain Morgan move to the top at the quarter pole.

Bay State Pat went up again at the three quarter mark and paced under the wire a length and a half in front of Commander Bill. Keppoch Playgirl finished third. The mile of 2:13 2/5 was a new mark for Bay State Pat.

Keppoch Playgirl led from wire to wire in winning the second heat. Driver Harold Stead took her away in fifth position and went to top followed by Brady's Battle. Suffolk Chief was third, Captain Morgan fourth and Bay

State Pat fifth. MacGregor made no mistake with Bay State Pat in the final heat. He took the young mare up from third place at the three quarter pole and breezed around the upper turn and down the stretch a length out front.

Keppoch Playgirl, who paced practically all the mile in second position, finished second while Ed Downe reined Suffolk Chief home third.

**Landy Comments Following Mile**  
VANCOUVER — (CP) — John Landy, whose 3:06 mile Saturday wasn't good enough to beat Roger Bannister in the British Empire Games feature, said Monday he had a sore left heel as a result of the race but otherwise was all right.

"People have seen me limping since the race Saturday and perhaps got the idea that I went into a mile with something wrong. "There was nothing at all wrong with my feet before the race. If there had been the slightest thing, I just couldn't have run and that's that."

Landy said he will leave Vancouver for London Aug. 13 and will compete in the Highland Games at Edinburgh Aug. 21.

He doesn't know yet what event he will run in—the mile, the 800-yard run or what. He doesn't know what opposition he will have but "I hope it isn't very serious."

Landy also said that if he is still running when the next Olympic games come along in 1956 he hopes to compete at Melbourne.

### Was Victim Of A Miracle

NORTH TONAWANDA, N. Y. (AP)—Joe Less rubbed his aching ribs and conceded that he was a "victim of a miracle."

Less, a 46-year-old boat racing enthusiast, was flipped into the Niagara river Saturday as his hydroplane, Mama's Mink, roared along at 120 miles an hour on a test run.

### Alexander Visits Rifle Range

SOUTH MARCH, Ont. (CP)—Lord Alexander, Britain's defence chief who opened the British Empire Games in Vancouver, visited these rifle ranges near Ottawa Monday at the opening of the 86th annual Dominion of Canada Rifle Association prize shoot.

The former Canadian governor-general, in Ottawa as the guest of Maj.-Gen. H. F. G. Letson, adviser on militia matters and president of DCRRA, spent about an hour along the half-mile firing range speaking to a number of the marksmen competing in opening day matches.

Lord Alexander is no stranger at these ranges 14 miles west of Ottawa. During his term as governor-general he was a regular visitor during the week-long shoot. He is a champion shot of the Irish Guards.

Lord Alexander and Brooke Claxton, President of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company and former Canadian defence minister, who accompanied the British defence chief, recalled a visit they made to these ranges in September, 1951.

At that time the standard rifle was a much debated issue. So that they would know what the experts were talking about during meetings with other countries on the subject, the then governor-general, Mr. Claxton and Maj.-Gen. Letson came to the ranges bringing with them the various rifles which were being considered as the standard rifle, examined them and tried them out from the 200-yard range.

### Chadwick Fails To Swim Strait Of Juan De Fuca

VICTORIA, (CP) — Florence Chadwick failed in her attempt to swim the Strait of Juan de Fuca Monday and was pulled into her boat about 1 1/2 hours after she entered the water.

Miss Chadwick, who entered the chilly waters of the Strait at 4:42 a.m. was pulled out again at 9:33 a.m. shortly after she had been sick.

The famed distance and channel swimmer, who swam the English channel three times, was attempting what she admitted earlier was the hardest swim of her life—the 18 1/2-mile course between here and Port Angeles, Wash. Nobody has ever made the swim.

Miss Chadwick had started to swim strongly again after she became sick, then at 9:45 her brother Dick who was riding the pilot boat immediately ahead of her talked to her and she was assisted aboard.

She looked very weak but managed to smile and wave as a helicopter and a press boat went by her.

"I'm feeling fine and want to try it again," she called over. She had covered about 11 miles of the crescent-shaped course she was following. Apparently the current was too much for her.

The decision to quite came as a surprise. She had been swimming strongly until she became ill. Her coach, Archie McKinnon.
