

Joe Louis Pounds Out Unanimous Decision In Bout With Agramonte

 MIAMI, Fla., Feb. 7—(AP)—Joe Louis pounded out a unanimous 10-round decision over Omelio Agramonte of Cuba here tonight to clear another roadblock on the comeback trail toward another heavyweight championship fight.

The Brown Bomber, favored to win in four rounds or less, failed to catch the dancing Cuban with a knockout blow, but Agramonte, eyeing a hanging on desperately as the bell ended the 10th round.

Agramonte's retreating tactics kept him out of trouble for seven rounds, but Joe opened a rash over the Cuban's eye in the eighth, pounded him hard in the ninth and had him on the verge of a knockout all through the 10th.

Louis weighed 209, the lightest since he reigned as heavyweight king. Agramonte weighed 187.

A crowd of 13,440 paid a gross gate of \$60,000 to witness the outdoor battle in the Miami Stadium.

The game Agramonte gave Louis a surprisingly good fight for seven rounds. In the second, the Cuban champion reddened Joe's nose with a stiff left and Louis responded by driving him into the ropes with a flurry of rights and lefts. Agramonte slipped to one knee but bounded up immediately.

A right to the jaw staggered Agramonte in the fourth, but he recovered quickly and the next three rounds were close. Late in the seventh, Joe pounded Agramonte with a series of hard blows but just before the bell the Cuban rallied and landed a savage right and left to Joe's head.

Agramonte weakened in the eighth as Louis stalked him around the ring.

In the ninth, Joe knocked him into the ropes with a hard right chop to the jaw and Agramonte hung on as the Bomber pounded him with rights and lefts.

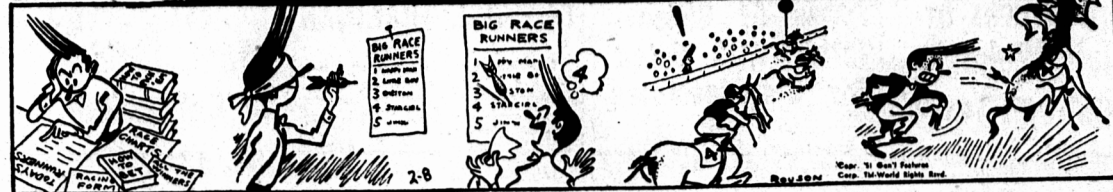

If local hockey fans who were at the Forum for the game between Islanders and Halifax on Tuesday night, went there for the purpose of witnessing an exciting game of hockey, then they sure got their money's worth. Coming up with a fast, wide-open first period, and developing into a rough and rousing second and third frame, the game produced thrills and excitement by the minute that had some 1,450 cash customers on the edge of their seats all night and hollering their lungs out.

It was the second contest in less than a week between the two clubs that gave local fans here the action and good hockey that they want to see. Although the previous encounter, last Friday night, came up with a quieter and more consistent brand of hockey on the whole, the Tuesday night encounter was a crowd pleaser all the way and came up with plenty of good hockey in between numerous flareups that brought about a total of 23 penalties, probably the largest in any one game this season.

But it was a game, that despite its roughness and excitement, never saw any injury to players as the result of various outbreaks and scuffles that not only involved the players, but both referees and coach Leo Lamoureux of the Islanders, who for the first time this season was sent off for a bench during a contest. And for a change, it was only the Islanders who were the target for the referees and couldn't be named the aggressors and perpetrators that brought about the hot sessions throughout the game, although they were involved in them nevertheless.

Halifax picked up 13 of the awards, including majors to Pat Powers and Frank Grabowski and misconduct to goalie Eddie D'Aoust and Hughie Campbell, while Islanders collected the remaining 10 majors, (which automatically becomes a misconduct according to the rules), the rest being made of minor infractions for tripping, roughing, high sticking etc.

Following close on the heels of an uneven first period as far as roughness was concerned, but produced fast, open hockey that saw the Islanders hold a large and most decided edge on the 13-54 mark of the second frame, that put six men in the penalty box in a space of 61 seconds of play. The fracas started when defenceman Pat Powers of Halifax took a flying tackle at Phil Vitale after he and Wally Black had broken up a slight roughing duel along the boards near the Halifax players bench. Vitale was skating back down towards his own zone when Powers came at him from behind for no other apparent reason than the fact that Vitale had been roughing it with Black.

The two big boys went to the ice in a scramble of legs, arms and tossing torsos, with Vitale underneath and Powers working him over. But the big Islanders rear-guard was not long in getting on and reversing the action. Finally the fray was broken up by referees and players, and both were sent to "sin bin" with majors for fighting. That is when coach Lamoureux got into the act. Rushing up to the penalty box from his players bench, Leo protested to referee Casey Bradshaw that Vitale shouldn't have gotten a major for his part in the fray. Bradshaw of course had made his decision, and was not in the mood to change it.

So Leo "The Lion" roared, and things waxed pretty hot around the penalty box that ultimately ended in the Islanders' mentor being escorted to the Forum office for the remainder of the game, while left winger Johnny Horeck, out with a leg injury, handled the team

from the bench for the rest of the game. Admittedly, Lamoureux got a little hot over the incident, but judging from what was seen of the action from the press box, he certainly had a legitimate beef. However, it is not "to reason why" and that is what they leave referees out there for, and will leave it to the "powers that be" to decide on the issue.

Following that outburst, things continued rough, and Marcel Clements and Frank Grabowski swelled the penalty ranks to four when they were chased for roughing and holding respectively, with Hub Beau-dure and Trent Anderson from his players bench. Leo protested to referee Casey Bradshaw that Vitale shouldn't have gotten a major for his part in the fray. Bradshaw of course had made his decision, and was not in the mood to change it.

The third period heralded the resuming of hostilities as soon as it got underway. Playing it rough, Halifax garnered three penalties before the 2:18 mark had been reached. McLaughlin started the ball rolling at 1:59 with a hooking penalty, and Hughie Campbell, was awarded a misconduct for protesting the award too strenuously. But the lid really blew off again when Ed D'Aoust came involved in the picture. After turning in a sensational job in the Halifax cage for two periods against terrific onslaughts by Islanders, the Saints' custodian completely lost his head.

Grabowski, getting the third penalty for Halifax for holding during an attack around the Halifax net, D'Aoust came out of his cage after referee Kane with murder in his eye. Chasing the local official right to the penalty box, Eddie did his best to get at Kane, but team members held him back, and except for that action, might have got himself into much more serious trouble than the misconduct penalty which was awarded him for his outburst.

However, nothing more came of it, and although the play was anything but tame for the remainder of the game, Islanders banged home two more goals for their winning margin and Dutchak was chased for charging and Vitale and Grabowski collected majors for a brief demonstration of fistfights.

Lamoureux In Caustic Comment On Penalties

Leo Lamoureux, coach of the Islanders in the Big Four League, fired a broadside at the penalty routine being followed in the league these past few months.

"Skamed up over Tuesday night's encounter during which 23 penalties and several fistic uprisings kept the rink in an uproar, Lamoureux unburended himself to the press this wise:

"It was," said Lamoureux, "one of the few times this year that our club did not labour under the handicap of absorbing most of the penalties during a game. Almost always we have had penalties plastered on us in the ratio of two or three to one. In Saint John last Saturday night we played short-handed on seven occasions while the Beavers were below strength only once.

"We play rugged hockey," he continued, "and we do earn penalties, but we object to officials taking it for granted that the Islanders are pre-ordained to fill the penalty box every game, as though it was a league rule.

"As an example of what I mean," said the Charlottetown Coach, "Tuesday night Black and Vitale roughed each other up on the boards, but the mixup was not serious enough to draw penalties. "However as Vitale turned away Pat Powers attacked him from the rear, making an unexpected semi-flying tackle, on our defenceman, knocking him down. Vitale struggled and finally rolled Powers over and exchanged blows with the Halifax boy. Powers was plainly the aggressor, but both men were given five minutes. Vitale's penalty at the most should have been two minutes.

"This incident is typical of what my team has had to contend with in the great majority of games. The principle seems to have been established that if any doubt exists at all the benefit of the doubt goes against the Islanders. It is safe to say that we have spent a considerable length of time in the penalty box beyond our dues. No team can continue to win while playing with five men for a good part of each game.

"We would ask the men with the whistle to look both ways because after all there are two teams on the ice."

Trust Fund For Boxer's Widow

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7—(AP)—A trust fund of \$15,843 has been set up for the widow and two children of the late Sonny Boy West, the Washington Negro lightweight boxer who died after a fight in New York just before Christmas.

Most of the money, \$12,304, came from a benefit bout here Jan. 4. West died after he was knocked out by Percy Bassett of Philadelphia. Bassett fought on the benefit card, and contributed half his purse to West's family.
