The motion was seconded by Mrs. J. A. Clark, president of the Ladies Aid of the Hospital, on behalf of that organization. Mr. F. W. Tidmarsh spoke in support of the motion.

The report of the trustees as presented by the chairman, Mr. W. K. Rogers, contained a wealth of information as to the operation of the hospital during the past year, a review of the financial situation and a short summary outlining the growth of the institution during its fifty-three years in existence.

A surplus of \$84.93 on the year's business was one of the cheering items contained in the financial statement. The report of the board of trustees appears in full below. The old ferry "Prince Edward Island" has been handling the traffic on the Borden-Tormentine service. Freight which accumulated at Tormentine during the week was ferried across the strait by special trips of "Prince Edward" yesterday. Heavy automobile traffic during the week caused the freight to accumulate on the New Brunswick side officials said. The S. S. Charlottetown is expected to resume the service Thursday.

Summerside police awaited result of a chemical analysis of the contents of the internal organs of Mr. Bert Paquet, 51-year-old Charlottetown engineer, found dead in a rooming house there Friday, before the inquest into his death could be continued. The stomach and other organs of the deceased had been sent to Saint John, N. B., for examination. Thorough inquiry into the case and all circumstances surrounding the Charlottetown engineer's death was decided upon after Mrs. Bruce Hum, wife of one of Paquet's long-boarders at the Summerside rooming house told a coroner's jury she had heard threats against the railroadman's life. Summerside police announced last night they expected no developments in the case until report of the stomach analysis had been received. It had been announced after the inquest there was no evidence of foul play in the death.

Business was definitely on the upgrade in the British West Indies, Mr. Walter Hyndman, who returned last week from a two months visit to the West Indies, said during the weekend. The "Lady" boats operating on the Canada-West Indies service were crowded with both passengers and freight. There was also a good deal of traffic between the various islands, Mr. Hyndman said.

Mr. Myers is resuming his former business as contractor in Charlottetown. His qualifications are well and favorably known to Charlottetown citizens.

In the death of Mr. Edwin Paynter, which occurred after a brief illness last Friday morning, May 8th at the home of his son-in-law, Mr. Burrows Moore, Kensington, this community has lost one of its oldest and most highly respected citizens. He was the youngest and last surviving member of a family of eight, and his passing, after a long full life time of 82 years, removes another link with the past, with the early days and those heroic souls who have gone before, which cannot be replaced. Living the greater part of his life in Burlington, where he was a successful farmer at that place, some fifteen years ago he retired, and with Mrs. Paynter came to Kensington, to spend his declining years with his daughter, Mrs. Moore.

FINDS DEATH DUE TO NATURAL CAUSES - Following a post mortem examination of the body of Peter Woods, who was found lying dead in an alleyway on Upper Water street early yesterday morning, Dr. F. V. Woodbury announced that death had been due to acute gastritis and no inquiry would be ordered. Woods was discovered in an alleyway adjoining 129 Upper Water Street, shortly before 2 o'clock yesterday morning by John Kervin, who was returning to his home. The deceased is a son of John Woods and is survived by his parents and three brothers - Halifax, Friday, May 15. (The late Mr. Woods was the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Woods, formerly of this city, where he was a frequent visitor.)

Prince Edward Island farmers and fishermen were in a dismal mood last night. Freezing weekend weather which brought a light snowfall to the province shattered farmers' hopes of being able to start planting this week, while the dirty weather had robbed the Island fishermen of expected plentiful catches. Charlottetown experimental station announced last night the temperature had fallen to 32 Saturday evening. Last night it was at the 40 mark. The Experimental Farm officials admitted the season was "backward" despite extraordinarily early advent of spring.

An early crop of wheat was sown by many farmers April 20 but no seed had been put into the ground since. Cold weather had also held up lobster fishing in the province as temperatures were generally below the average mark of previous seasons. Rain and storms kept the lobster fishermen away from their traps and catches have been small. Last night it was slightly warmer but there was no indication of fair weather for the start of the new week.
