Dear D.D.: In your shoes, I would talk to a good lawyer about the situation, also to a good clergyman, to get a well rounded intelligence estimate on how to deal with the stunk who is chasing your wife, without widening the rift in marriage if that can be avoided. Inasmuch as your wife admits being all mixed-up, and you feel on the verge of a nervous breakdown, both of you should have additional firsthand help from a psychologist or family relations counsellor.

Is there a Family Service agency in your community? Or a local branch of the YMCA or YWCA or the Legal Aid Bureau or the American Red Cross, that could act in emergency to steer you in the direction of proper counsel?

The average husband wouldn't wait to be told what to do, however, if he found a two - timing wife, he would order him out of his premises in his absence, trying to steal his wife's affection. He not only would order him off the place; he would mop up the floor with him, while speaking, that is, if he were big and strong.

There was a large gathering at the United Union here on Monday afternoon to witness the marriage of Miss Eileen Murray and Dick Van Herk.

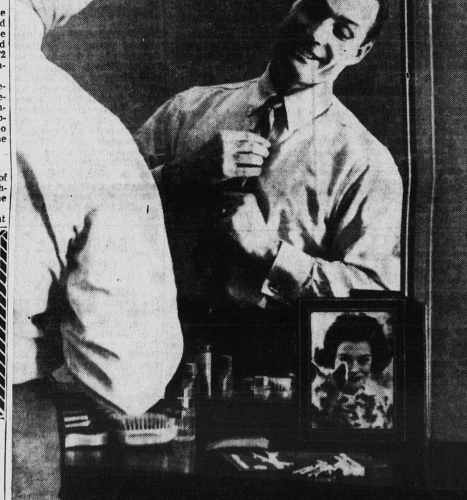
Collection amounted to \$1.05. The surprise package amounted to \$65 and was won by Mrs. George MacKay.
