Today Is Big Kickoff For Souris Exhibition

SOURIS — Today is kickoff day for the annual two-day Souris fisheries exhibition and regatta.

To start the proceedings, a baseball game will be played with the Montague Little League coming her to battle the local Little League team, coached by Jerry McCormack. This is an annual duel and should be a crowd-pleaser.

Then at 6:30 p.m. tug-of-war preliminaries will be held for both the Island open and lightweight divisions.

The open championship carries with it the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce trophy and a cash prize of \$100, while second prize is \$50. In the lightweight division the top prize is \$50 and second \$25.

The competition has teams entered from at least five centres: St. Peter's, Rollo Bay, Dundas, Charlottetown, and the defending champions from Red Point.

At 9:30 the queen of the sea contest judging will take place in Souris Regional High School auditorium. The judges will be Mr. and Mrs. Fred MacKinnon and Mrs. James Haslam, all of Charlottetown. They will pick from seven contestants.

They are: Michelle Peters of Souris, sponsored by the Souris Lions Club; Margaret Grant, Souris, sponsored by the Souris branch Royal Canadian Legion; Anne-Marie White, Rollo Bay, sponsored by the Souris Regional High School.

Fed., Provincial Officials May Attend '67 Natal Day

Invitations to Charlottetown's 1967 Natal Day celebrations will be sent to the governor-general, prime minister and all provincial premiers, Mayor W. J. Cox said yesterday.

What is expected to be the biggest Natal Day show in the city's history will likely include, instead of the traditional church parade, an open air drum band service in Victoria Park with all citizens attending the church service.

Mayor Cox said invitations to government officials will be sent far enough in advance to permit planning by official involved. He believes acceptances will be received since this would be the official Centennial "day" of Charlottetown for 1967. Since it is expected that practically all communities in Canada will be taking an active part in celebrating the 100th birthday of the country it is felt Charlottetown, as the Birthplace of Canada, should play a significant part in the proceedings.

Because this will be the one day of the year which the city will devote to taking part on a national basis, it is believed the top government authorities will readily accept the invitations to be present.

FOCAL POINT
Mayor Cox believes the 1967 Natal Day could be the focal point of civic planning for participation here in the Centennial and would bring invaluable national publicity in its wake.

The first step he said will be formation of a committee to plan the big event and "in my opinion no better chairman could be had for such a job than former mayor A. Walther Gaudet," he stated. The mayor added he would ask Mr. Gaudet to serve in that capacity in order to bring to the job all his experience in planning for 1964 and the city's own 100th birthday in 1955.

It is possible arrangements could be made for a celebration of more than the one day with Natal Day Sunday providing either the opening or the climax. On the proposed committee to plan the event would probably be the members of the present city public relations committee, headed by the Mayor, representatives of the Navy, Army, Air Force and Canadian Legion, and possibly some civilian citizen representation.

The mayor stated he expects to get the official invitations off to the various dignitaries, as quickly as possible.

Mr. McCuaig, who preached at St. James one Sunday last June, is expected to come to Charlottetown in September. He will fill a vacancy created by the recent death of Rev. Dr. T.H.B. Somers.

The decision regarding the call was made following representations by four commissioners from the congregation, E.K. MacNutt, Kirk Session; Mrs. Frank Curtis, women's organizations; George Chandler, church board; and Mr. Brown, Kirk men.

Meat On Trains Okay For RCs

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada's Roman Catholics will be allowed to eat meat while travelling on trains beginning this Friday, it was announced today by the Canadian Catholic Conference.

The dispensation from church laws of abstinence also applies to other days when Catholics may not eat meat.

Train travellers in the U.S. recently were granted a similar dispensation by Rome.

The application of the bishops of Canada was submitted by Most Rev. Sergio Pignedoli, apostolic delegate to Canada.

Sask. Gov't Places Emphasis On Potash Industry Output

REGINA (CP)—The importance of the Saskatchewan potash industry in the development of potash production was illustrated recently when Industry Minister Gordon Grant announced a major three-day potash show and conference would be held Oct. 25-27 in Saskatoon.

Mr. Grant said the show, to be sponsored by his department, will serve to publicize the importance of the industry, not only to Saskatchewan's economy but to that of Canada's and the world.

The industry minister joins Premier Ross Thatcher who has said that potash will contribute to Saskatchewan's economy in the same way oil resources poured millions of dollars into Alberta's economy.

The impact of the potash industry, Mr. Grant said, will make itself felt in Canada's world trade balance, in revenues to the federal and provincial treasuries and provide thousands of jobs, directly in mining and indirectly in secondary industries.

PREDICT MONEY INFLUX
Millions of dollars will circulate through the province in wages and consumption of materials in the industry annually and it is apparent Saskatchewan will become a major transportation centre, Mr. Grant said.

So far investment made and committed by industry in the development of the province's potash resources exceeds \$400,000,000, Mr. Grant said, could possibly reach \$1,000,000,000 by 1970.

Two Weeks Said Needed For Park Bridge To Open

Bruce MacLennan, district engineer, public works department, Charlottetown, estimated yesterday it will be at least two weeks before the Covehead Bridge will be open for traffic.

It was explained there are two beams to be installed. One of them is being installed now, and after that is completed, the driving surface will be paved and sidewalks built.

The bridge is part of the Gulf Shore Drive which will link the various sections of the National Park when it is completed.

The remaining link to be completed in the drive is the bridge across the harbor at North Rustico, and the bits of highway that will link it to the existing highway.

This is a decision for the national parks people and there has been no indication in the estimates this year that immediate action is expected.

City Flyer Aids Rescue In Labrador

An exciting and trying search for two missing children in the wilds of Labrador ended happily when a Charlottetown man spotted them in about 20 minutes flying time.

The small youngsters had been missing for some time when Campbell McNeil, 23-year-old son of Supt. A. S. McNeil, RCMP, and Mrs. McNeil, suggested to the distraught father they take to the air as a supplement to the ground search underway.

Campbell, a student at Nova Scotia Tech, last year took a civilian flying course and had qualified with both wheels and floats. He obtained his department of transport license before he went to Labrador City where he is employed this summer with the Iron Ore Co. of Canada.
