Chataway Sets Three-Mile Record At Empire Games

VANCOUVER (CP)—England's runners ran wild Tuesday at the British Empire Games, scoring one-two-three in both the men's three miles and 880 yards and a hop, step and jump artist gave the Mother Country a third championship—half of all those fought for in Empire Stadium.

In five of the world finals, former Empire Games records were broken although one had been bettered here Saturday in heats and was not again beaten Tuesday.

Red-headed Chris Chataway, starting his magnificent sprint 200 yards from the finish, romped off with the three-mile run in Games record time of 13:32.2, three seconds slower than the world record and more than 24 seconds faster than the distance has ever been run in the Games.

Fred Green, world-record-holder with 13:32.2, was second and Frank Sando third. Green and Chataway are co-holders of the world record 13:32.2.

SET DIZZY PACE

The dizzy pace of the Englishmen, who really got rolling at the halfway mark, was so terrific that they carried three other runners to a record mark and a seventh man tied it.

Derek Johnson led Brian Hewson and Ian Boyd to the tape in the 880 yards final in Games record time of 1:50.7. Hewson tied the old record of 1:51.2.

England's third gold medal was won late in the day when Ken Wilmshurst won the hop, step and jump with a mark of 50 feet, 1 1/2

Kid Howard Wins Decision Over Eddie Jones

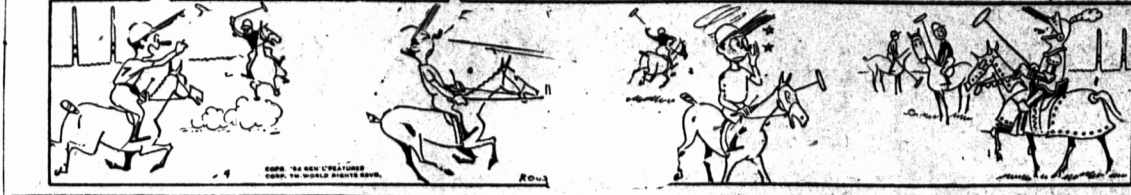
HALIFAX (CP)—Richard (Kid) Howard, Maritime lightweight champion, scored an unanimous decision Tuesday night over Eddie Jones of Buffalo, N. Y., in a 10-round main bout before 4,000 fans here.

Howard, at 138, was three pounds heavier than James. The more experienced Howard carried the fight to his opponent, who showed more footwork than punching power.

There were no knockdowns. James opened a cut over Howard's right eye in the fourth round which hampered the stocky puncher until the end.

In the six-round semi-finals, Keith Paris, 137 1/2, of Halifax won a split decision over Gramps Kiley, 139 1/2, Sydney, and Leroy Jones, 129 1/2, Halifax, scored an unanimous decision over Bobby Lafin, 127, Sydney Mines.

Racing driver Edmond Shaw, who suffered a broken leg in last Saturday night's meet at the Charlottetown Driving Park, hopes to be a spectator at the races during Old Home Week. Shaw had his leg broken above the ankle and is still a patient in hospital although he expects to be released within a few days. He suffered the injury when thrown from Abner McGraw's sulky as the field left the starting gate. Fortunately Shaw was on the outside of the track and not in the midst of the pack. It was Shaw's first accident with Abner McGraw who is usually on his good behavior and whom Edwood regards as quite easy to drive. Under Shaw's guidance Abner McGraw has been coming along well within the past two years and was just hitting top condition for Old Home Week.

Over in New Glasgow on Monday night another athlete who makes the Island his home, was taken to hospital with head injuries following a fight. We refer to Gaston Roy, who hails from Quebec City but attended St. Dunstan's during the academic year. Roy suffered undetermined head injuries when his head hit the canvas after being down for the third time in the eighth round. He was fighting Doug Odo, a hard-hitting middleweight who works in the mines around the Stellarton-New Glasgow area. Roy was released from hospital yesterday morning and returned to Halifax.

Don and Les Trainor of Charlottetown attended the fight. They claim it was a savage battle during the first seven rounds with Roy having the edge. Roy evidently planned to knock out Odo within six rounds and went all out from the opening gong. However, Odo tagged Roy hard in the eighth round and floored the Collegian. Roy wanted to get back up immediately but was forced to take an eight count.

As they came down the stretch Gahagan sneaked through on the rail and win.

Babe Britton led no doubt about the final dash. Len O'Meara took the smooth pacing mare away on top but surrendered the lead at the three-eighths pole to Ann's Boy. The Babe pulled out again in the stretch to win by nearly a length.

Abner McGraw led from wire to wire in winning both the third and seventh dashes. Mary Merk and Esso were about half a length behind at the finish of his record breaking mile.

Keppock Playgirl moved up from behind on both occasions to win the second and sixth dashes. She passed Avalon Girl in the stretch to win the second dash and she came from fourth to win the sixth.

Feather Duster beat off a challenge by Tartan to win the first dash and Cyril Smith drove Tartan from wire to wire to win the

The first major track and field meet of the year will be staged at the Charlottetown Driving Park this afternoon in connection with the Gathering of the Clans celebrations.

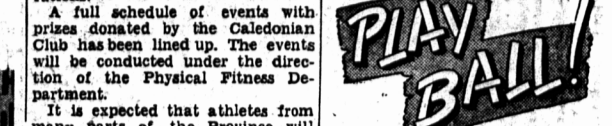
A full schedule of events with prizes donated by the Caledonian Club has been lined up. The events will be conducted under the direction of the Physical Fitness Department.
