### N.B. Police Watch For U.S. Murder Fugitive

SAINT JOHN, N.B., Sept. 1 (CP) — Police throughout New Brunswick were on watch tonight for an armed ex-convict, wanted for murder in Maine, who may be in this province.

A police officer who declined use of his name said there was reason to believe the slayer of a restaurant proprietor in Auburn, Me., has escaped across the border into New Brunswick.

The fugitive was accompanied by two men and a woman when he fled the scene of the shooting Aug. 26. A Maine State Police trooper said the car carrying the four was last reported seen in Mattawamkeag and Skowhegan, Me. From these places they could have headed for a number of border crossing points in either Aroostook or Washington counties.

### Legion Resolutions Stress Need Of Compulsory Training

Mr. Earle G. Cannon, Summerside, was elected president of the Provincial Command at the annual convention held in the Legion Home here yesterday. He largely attended meeting of the local command of the Canadian Legion also named Lieut. Col. J. A. MacPhee, also of Summerside, as the honorary president.

Lumsden, M.M., Dominion President of the Canadian Legion, B.E.S.L., in an address yesterday. He was speaking at the opening ceremonies of the Provincial Command Convention at the Prince Edward Theatre.

### Alexander Urges Britain Speed-up Aircraft Output

LONDON, Sept. 1 (Reuters) — Defence Minister Earl Alexander tonight urged British aircraft manufacturers to exert their "utmost endeavours" to step up production for Britain and her allies.

Observing that aircraft exports were not confined to completed machines, the Defence Minister said it would be valuable to supply manufacturing licences to Commonwealth and Allied countries to enable them to produce British types of planes or engines for themselves.

### Opening Today Of City Schools

The long summer holiday is over and this morning will be back to school again for thousands of urban youngsters throughout the Province. In this city it is believed that the heavy registration of recent years will be repeated and all city schools are expected to have all the pupils they can possibly handle.

For several years past local schools have found that the new entrants have fully taxed the facilities with the result that most of the junior grades have to be taught in two or even three divisions. Continuation of this trend has added to the teaching burden by adding to the number of necessary classes in the higher grades.

No estimate could be made yesterday of the number of pupils entering the classes this morning, but it was not believed that there would be any great difference in the registrations on opening days of the past several years.

### Dr. Boulter Describes Work Of Archaeologists In Athens

Here on a brief visit before returning to his duties at the University of Cincinnati is Dr. Cedric Boulter, son of Mrs. Boulter and the late Mr. J. Wilfred Boulter, Charlottetown, after a year of archaeological activities at Athens, Greece.

Dr. Boulter's first visit to Greece as an archaeologist was in 1934-35. In 1937 he took part in excavations at ancient Troy, near the Dardanelles. He revisited Greece in the summer of 1950, and on the present occasion remained from September, 1951, until last June, specializing in the study of pottery designs from the rich store of material which is being excavated on the site of the Agora of ancient Athens.

Here, in the fifth century B.C., was the market place and centre of the commercial and civic life of the community during the most glorious period of Grecian history; and here, in the presence of them.

### Labor Day Activities Are Marred By Fatality List

(By the Canadian Press) Canada's Labor Day week-end took a total of 65 lives from Friday night to Monday midnight. Four persons were reported missing.

A Canadian Press survey early today showed 34 traffic deaths, 17 drownings with four missing and 12 fatalities from other causes. Ontario recorded 11 deaths by drowning and nine from traffic accidents. Quebec showed 11 traffic fatalities and six drownings. Nova Scotia had five traffic deaths, New Brunswick five, Manitoba two, Alberta four and Prince Edward Island one.

Last year's total was 53 deaths of which 39 were traffic and 14 drowning.

### U. S. Labor Day Fatalities 474

CHICAGO, Sept. 1 (AP) — The Labor Day holiday accident toll surged to 474 deaths—371 on highways—as the long week-end neared its close tonight. Drivers on congested highways had this word from Ned H. Dearborn, president of the National Safety Council: "unless drivers heed their good judgement and common sense, we may pile up an all-time high in traffic deaths for any Labor Day."

### FISHING TRAGEDY

CHATHAM, Ont., Sept. 1 (CP) — Three Dover township boys were drowned today when a sudden squall swirled over Lake St. Clair and upset the small boat in which they were fishing about 12 miles northeast of here. Reported drowned were: Roger Emery, 10.

### Halifax Naval Man Killed In Highway Crash At Pownal

Private Officer 2nd Class Ronald F. Darby, a resident of Ontario stationed at H.M.C.S. Stadacona, Halifax, N.S., was instantly killed at about 7 p.m. Sunday, when the panel truck in which he was a passenger left the highway and overturned at Pownal. Three other occupants of the truck escaped injury, while a fourth received only minor bruises which did not require medical attention.

The victim was one of a party of naval men from H.M.C.S. Stadacona who has crossed by Wood Island ferry en route to the city where they were to take part in the Labour Day track meet at Memorial Field, Charlottetown, under the auspices of the personnel of H.M.C.S. Queen Charlotte. The deceased is said to have been sitting with the driver when passing another truck, and in an endeavour to give the oncoming car a wide berth, a soft shoulder of the road was touched. In attempting to return to the pavement, the car skidded out of control, and overturned in the ditch.

The deceased who lived with his wife and three children at Dartmouth was an outstanding athlete and held in high esteem by his shipmates at Halifax. The body was taken to Halifax yesterday evening.

### U. S. Miners End Memorial Holiday

PITTSBURGH, Sept. 1 (AP) — Most coal operators in the United States prepared today to resume production shortly after midnight—the time set to end a 10-day Memorial Holiday called by the United Mine Workers' boss, John L. Lewis.

### Mexico Meeting To Air World Currency Problems

OTTAWA, Sept. 1 (CP) — Finance Minister Abbott, accompanied by economic and financial advisers, left for Mexico City by air today to represent Canada at new talks on world currency problems.

The talks will be held at the 10-day annual meeting of the 58-country International Monetary Fund and World Bank which opens Wednesday.

### British Labor Is Urged To Support Rearmament

By Sidney Welland — MARGATE, England, Sept. 1 (Reuters) — Trade Union Chief Arthur Deakin appealed to British workers today to support rearmament as the means of keeping "peace, justice and the reign of law in the world."

Deakin's presidential address to the opening session of the Trades Union Congress kicked off a seething dispute. A growing Leftist revolt has challenged the T. U. C.'s steady defence of the rearmament program.

### U.S. Opens Borders To Mexican Cattle

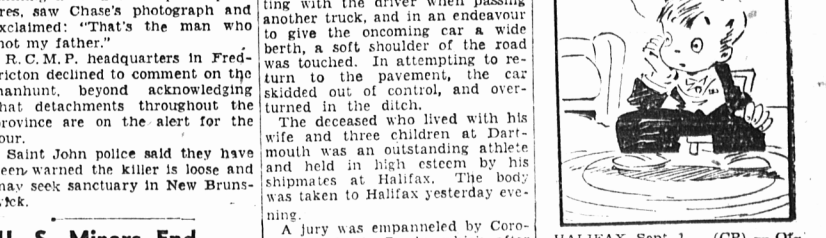
WASHINGTON, Sept. 1 (AP) — The United States today reopened its border to Mexican cattle and other livestock and to fresh, frozen and chilled meats. They had been closed since December, 1946, because of an outbreak of foot-and-mouth disease in Mexico.

The U.S. still bars the importation of livestock or fresh, frozen or chilled meats from Canada. The Canadian border was closed early this year after the foot-and-mouth disease was discovered there. The Canadian Government has said, however, that the disease has been wiped out.
