Renounced His Rank and Titles.

LONDON, Feb. 20.—The Paris correspondent of the Times says: According to a letter just received here from Argentina, the Austrian Archduke John, alias John Orth, is now residing with his morganatic wife on a farm in the River Parara district and is more than ever resolved to renounce the prerogatives of his birth. The Austrian Archduke John Nopomuk Salvator, the youngest son of the Grand Duke Leopold II. of Tuscany, in 1889 renounced his rank and all his Austrian military titles owing to an irreconcilable quarrel with the aged field Marshal, Archduke Albert, against whom the impetuous young prince was allowed to commit the grossest possible breach of discipline. Assuming the name Johann Orth, and fitting out a sailing vessel, he disappeared with his morganatic wife, who before her marriage was the well-known singer, Fraulein Stubel, and was not heard of again until reported that his ship, the St. Margarete, had been lost off the coast of South America in October, 1890. The next rumor as to his whereabouts was that he and most of his crew having escaped from the wreck, had landed near the mouth of the La Plata, and that the archduke, having paid off the sailors, had gone to Brazil.

EXCITING SCENES.

Colorado Springs Exchange Experiences a Most Exciting Day.

Today was the wildest, the longest, the most sensational day ever seen on the exchange here.

More than two and one-quarter million shares changed hands. The brokers in the inner circle jostled each other and shrieked at the tops of their voices for seven solid hours, and the largest crowd of spectators on record pushed and crowded and made room for brokers and messenger boys in the space outside the railing.

Isabella was the great sensation of the day, but there were lesser ones, satellites as it were, around the cause of all the commotion and excitement. The galsery was crowded, too, with spectators, most of them women, who did not hold their hand to their ears and appear amused at the babel of yells that came from below, but in their eyes shone the consciousness that their savings, large or small, hung in the balance, and there was the chance of a great fortune in those hopelessly invested dollars if only the market kept going the right way. Fully 600 people were in the exchange room throughout the long call, but they were not the same 600 all the time. People kept going and coming, turning back and forth, dropping in to see how the stocks were selling in moments snatched from their work.

Isabella climbed nearer the sky than ever before \$1.80 being the highest point reached. The lowest point was \$1.53. The stock opened at \$1.50 and closed at \$1.63. The difference in the value of the shares as indicated by the variations in the open quotation Saturday morning and the closing quotations today is \$1,550,000. At this rate the buying public is placing a high value on the ore that was encountered in the ninth level of the Lee Friday afternoon, but there are many who say that the stock will go even higher, and that there is no doubt in the world that it will touch \$3 before the sensation abates.

It took only a few minutes to come to Isabella on the board this morning and as soon as it was reached, there ensued the wildest spectacle that was ever witnessed on the local exchange. For about half an hour it seemed that bedlam had literally turned loose in the pit, and nobody seemed to be knowing what he was doing under the influence of the calculations that if only enough of the shares could be bought and sold there would be gold in plenty and no more toll and worry.

Brokers regrettably yesterday that there was a Sabbath intervening between the first and second, thinking that some of the interests would be allayed by the lapse of time, and that activity on the exchange would be less in consequence.

But such was not the case. The interest was, if anything, accentuated, and the time that intervened only served to make the pot boil more vigorously. The excitement never was more intense than it was this morning.

The brokers could hardly wait until the few producing mines that come on the list before Isabella could be passed. There were several strong advances in the former part of the call, noticeably in Anaconda and Ingham, but it seemed that the traders were husbanding their energies for the battle royal over Isabella. They could not contain themselves when Ingham closed but shouted wildly for Isabella, the yell coming from all along the rail all at the same time. Caller Wasson had not had time to announce the stock as usual.

A few bids were made in this first insane shout, but nothing could be distinguished. All sounds sounded alike, and it was all a roar. Caller Wasson pounded in vain for silence, but the brokers kept on shouting until their voices gave way from hoarseness, and they subsided, wiping the perspiration off their foreheads. At last the sound of the gavel could be distinguished, and then that sound became the most distinct in the tumult as the brokers became tired out. Caller Wasson absolutely refused to proceed with the call until order was restored, and he had his way.—Denver Republican.

[From other sources it is learned that the ore body in the Isabella is the richest and most extensive ever found in a mine since the opening of the Comstock lode in Nevada, the ore running as high as \$14,000 to the ton.]
